# A Message from the Coordinator of Family Ministry

How did your week of watchfulness go? Mine went really well! I definitely saw God's hand at work in so many places.

The first week of Advent called us to be vigilant... to be on guard... to be more attentive. We were invited to be more attentive to our relationship with Jesus... more in tune to the many ways that Jesus invites us to draw closer to Him. And as we draw closer, we become more vulnerable...we share more freely...we hold back less. And so the work of Advent began.

Throughout these days, we become ever so aware that we need a Savior and ever so grateful that our Heavenly Father felt we were worth sending one. And as our eyes and hearts are opened, we see more clearly, more frequently, how Jesus is working in our lives through the scriptures, through those around us, and in the natural beauty of our world. Let us remain vigilant so we don't miss a single, divine love note.

This week, our work continues with the challenge to, "Prepare the way of the Lord." But how can a retired school teacher, a single mom, an accountant, a police officer, a nurse, a doctor, an engineer, a landscaper, a chef, an aging widower, a teenager, a retail store manager or an elementary school student and everybody else, " Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God!"? How can we fill in every valley and make every mountain and hill low? What can we do to turn rugged land into a plain and rough country into a broad valley? Let's ponder that for a moment or two... or three.


Are we to pawn this job off on a civil engineering firm who can survey the land, adjust elevations and design straight roadways? I think not. As faith-filled, God-fearing Christians we don't have to contract with a company to get this project going. We need some quiet time and a willingness to take a good, long, honest look within our hearts and our lives to see where the bumpy roads are.


Perhaps we are stuck in the valley due to difficult circumstances that are beyond our control. How can we fill in that valley when others aren't willing to meet us halfway or we can't change the existing circumstances? We know that if we grab a shovel and start backfilling that valley with honesty, acceptance and hope, immediately we will have a partner helping us. One whose shovel is mightier than ours...one who can and will work harder and faster and with unfathomable determination to get us out of the valley. We can trust that if we want out... He will never leave us in the valley. That's just how The Savior is.

Perhaps it's not a valley, but a mountain or hill that is blocking the way; seemingly insurmountable obstacles that prevent us from moving forward. How can we make that mountain navigable? The tools to "make low the hill" may be well within our reach; but the choice to reach for them and start chipping away at the mountain is ours. Oh there they are...right in my toolbox! But these are the tools that you can get hurt with, especially if you're not careful. Sometimes we'd prefer not to even use them at all, rather than risk getting hurt! You know the tools that I'm talking about...authentic self-assessment...the willingness to see another perspective... admitting I'm wrong or afraid or unsure... asking for and offering forgiveness... and of course, there's that amazing tool....unconditional love. They're not easy tools to work with, but the Master welcomes and guides every apprentice who genuinely wants to learn how to use them well. He will work overtime to help you break down that barrier. That's what The Savior does.

But what about the rough and rugged land? How the heck can we turn that into a lush valley and a fruited plain? That might mean we have to grab the cultivator and the rototiller before we can scatter seed. But the cultivator of tenderness, acceptance and encouragement and the rototiller of understanding and patience can really do a great work with a hardened heart, especially when the hand of the Master guides that tiller over the roughest patches. And then when it's comes to sowing the seeds...the timing and follow-up care are critical. Good thing we have The Divine Sower to lead the way. He will work that rough land with you until the ground is fertile and ready to accept seed. He will sow seeds, even while you rest and water it, even if you forget. He's even more invested in making this part of your life fruitful, than you are. That's the commitment to you that the Savior has.

So dear friends, it's clear that we need The Savior. Let us continue the work of Advent, using the tools we have been generously given, leaning on the Master for guidance, assistance and timing. Let's not take a detour around the rough crooked roads, the deep valleys and the mountains. Let's do the work we need to do, to mend what is broken, make straight what has been twisted, get out of the valleys in which we have been stuck, and climb the heck out of those mountains that have frightened and paralyzed us. We know we won't go it alone and through the surrender of our wills and the entrusting of our hearts to Him... we will, in fact, be preparing the way of the Lord!

## From the Desk of Msgr. Walden

Christmas is now just two weeks away. For most of us, there are probably many things we want to do to prepare for that day. As much as it is about decorations, gifts, cards, and gatherings, even more, Christmas is about a true wonder and act of love on God's part - His entrance into our world and into our lives in the person of Jesus Christ. Two thousand twenty-three years later, we still celebrate His humble, loving entrance into our world. The key is to celebrate the wonder and amazement of God's desire to make us fully a part of His life and to thank Him for His presence in our personal lives.

One of the most beautiful, basic, and simple hopes expressed for what the Messiah would do when He came to save us was proclaimed in the first reading last Monday from Isaiah 2:1-5 where the prophet expressed the hope of every time and nation: "He shall judge between the nations and impose terms on many peoples. They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks; One nation shall not raise the sword against another, nor shall they train for war again". Personally, we cannot stop the conflicts going on in our nation and in our world, but we can be instruments and lights of hope, love, and peace in all we say and do each day.

In Jesus, God humbly entered our world and preached and lived the words above from Isaiah. Never did He respond to violence with violence or harsh words, only with the love and hope we all seek in our lives. The only obstacle Jesus could not overcome was the reluctance of those who encountered and listened to Him to open their hearts to Him. When we put the "busyness" of our everyday lives and the constant call of our electronic devices to get our attention together, we can easily miss the wonder of what we celebrate at Christmas and, in reality, what we celebrate every Sunday at Mass and every day of our lives -God's love and presence to us. What hope we find when we give God our time, attention and heart. The book I quoted last week was "The Rabbi's Heartbeat" by Brennan Manning. His thoughts are founded on the idea of putting our heads on the chest of Jesus and listening to His heartbeat. His is the heart of indestructible love and mercy, and constant concern and hope. Daily prayer, Sunday Mass are our opportunities to be renewed, inspired, and enlivened by Him.

I close with the Prayer of Abandonment from Blessed Charles de Foucauld:

## Father,

I abandon myself into your hands; do with me what you will.

Whatever you may do, I thank you.

I am ready for all, I accept all. Let only your will be done in me, and in all your creatures. I wish no more than this, O Lord.

Into your hands I commend my soul;
I offer it to you with all the love of my heart,
for I love you, Lord, and so need to give myself,
to surrender myself into your hands, without reserve,
and with boundless confidence, for you are my Father.



## Votive Candles/Altar Candles

A number of votive candles enlighten the beautiful statues in our church. You may have a particular devotion to one of these saints. These candles are next to the statues of the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph, St. Teresa, St. Gerard Majella and the Sacred Heart of Jesus. They bring a certain light to the statues and, hopefully, inspire some deeper times of prayer and reflection.

Altar Candles - \$25.00 per week.





As a Christian tradition, the wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us.

This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

Each of the candles lit before Christmas represent an aspect of preparation during the season of Advent.

### The First Week of Advent Represents: Hope

Candle Name: the Prophecy Candle Candle Color: Purple

Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church, it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent, we remember the Old Testament prophets who foretold of Jesus' coming with hope and anticipation.

### The Second Week of Advent Represents: Peace and Preparation

Candle Name: the Bethlehem Candle Candle Color: Purple

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

### The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: the Shepherd's Candle Candle Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

#### The Fourth Week of Advent Represents: Love

Candle Name: the Angel's Candle Candle Color: Purple

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

## Lighting Your Advent Wreath During the Week

Each day during the Fourth week of Advent, at the evening meal (or any time), light the first and second purple candles and the pink candle. The following prayers accompany the lighting of the candles.

All make the sign of the cross: **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen**. Someone at table reads the Scripture assigned to the liturgy of the day (one or both of the readings may be used). Go to <a href="https://www.usccb.org">www.usccb.org</a> to find the readings of the day. Then the Leader continues:

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

All respond: We lift them up to the Lord.

The Leader prays: God, the Father of mercies, you willed your Son to take flesh, in order to give life back to us. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may wait in watchfulness for the glorious coming of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

After the meal, the Leader says: Let us live soberly, justly, and devoutly in this world as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

All respond: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

# Second Sunday of Advent

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Can you hear it? The voice crying out in the desert? While John the Baptist was the one literally proclaiming, from the desert, the coming of the Lord, we should listen for echoes of his message today. John foretold that Jesus - the Father's Incarnate Son - was on his way to redeem the world. Through Jesus' passion and death, the gates of heaven were flung open so all who believe in him would have eternal life. This is the Good News he proclaimed then, and the Church proclaims today: Christ has come! Christ has died, Christ is risen, and Christ will come again. This is what we prepare for in Advent - to celebrate, on Christmas day, Christ's coming into the world, and that he will one day return in glory. The Lord gives comfort to his people in his words, and in his presence to us in the Eucharist: "According to his promise we await new heavens and a new earth in which righteousness dwells." So, trust in the Lord, remain vigilant, and take heed of the voices that remind us to "prepare the way of the Lord."


#### GO EVANGELIZE


PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Each year, we are given the gift of Advent. It is a season that invites us to slow down, reflect on the gift of Jesus and prepare to celebrate the Nativity of the Lord. Ironically, though, it happens at one of the most frenzied times of the year as we rush to keep up with cookie baking, tree decorating and merry-making. Advent is short - it includes four Sundays but can be three to four weeks long depending on the weekday upon which Christmas falls and it sometimes doesn't seem long enough to truly prepare our hearts. This year Advent is three weeks and a day - so we are close to reaching the midway point, which is a good time to ask ourselves: How tuned in are we to John the Baptist's message? If we feel like we're being carried along in a wave of consumerism, it's not too late to make a course correction. We can step away from the fray and carve out time to enjoy the stillness of Advent and truly listen to the voice crying out in the desert.

Love, the rose, is on the way.











# Women's Group...

Fr. Timothy Gallagher's book on The Discernment of Spirits, lists St. Ignatius' 14 rules for discernment, then goes through each rule a chapter at a time, describing how to apply it in our lives. In the ups & downs, consolations and desolations of our spiritual life, we go



through times of pure joy to "Where are You Jesus?"

St. Ignatius (1491-1556), recuperating from war wounds was given reading material on the life of Christ & the saints. As he thought about what he read, he became aware of his thought patterns, how the thoughts affected his feelings, and how the good feelings remained with him. When he had worldly thoughts, although he felt good while thinking them, he noticed that afterward the feelings left him empty. He continued reading spiritual books, growing in wisdom. God was leading him, fulfilling His Plan for him to be a great saint & to teach us. God's plan for us is the same, the process is slow.

As women who love Jesus, we need & want to learn to recognize Jesus' voice & grow closer to Him. At times we feel inadequate, wondering is this Jesus speaking, me or the enemy? In our group we begin to see we're all equal, with the same problems, emotions, weaknesses, confusion, strengths, desires, fears, doing the best we can, we don't have to be perfect. Jesus consoles us through our love for each other. If you feel desire to come but are fearful, we understand because we've been there & at times still are, so just come as you are, no rules or requirements, you don't have to read or share. We respect the privacy of others, sharing is anonymous!




# Sunday's Word 2024
