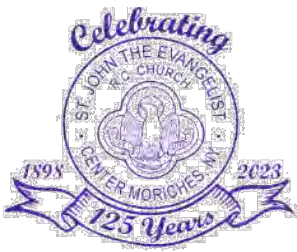

A Message from Angela Werner

A Reflection on the Gospel: John (1:6-8, 19-28)

"I am the voice of one crying out in the desert; make straight the way of the Lord."



For anyone with a passion for principles, John the Baptist is your man. He wasn't one to back down from a worthy moral conflict. To do so would be to walk away from loving. He wasn't even afraid to go head-to-head with King Herod himself, calling him out on his sinful behavior.

There are times when each of us are faced with a choice to either stand up for what is right, or take the path of least resistance. We might have to be that one voice crying out in the desert, or even risk being portrayed as a hairshirt for others, but

what is the alternative? Condoning bad behavior isn't real love. Tough love isn't easy. That's why it's called tough love. We are all on the same mission as John the Baptist, which is to help each other get to Heaven, and that starts with getting onto the straight path.

When that time comes, what will we say when God asks us what we did to help our brother or sister to walk the straight path? Will we have backed down because it was more comfortable for us, or spoken up because it was more helpful to them?

John the Baptist (who was beheaded) was willing to face martyrdom rather than compromise on principles. No guts, no glory!

The choices we make will either strengthen or weaken our relationship with God. Ultimately, they will either unite us to Him, or separate us from Him. Who among us would ever want to sever ourselves from God? What do we cling to? Is it this life which is passing away, or a life with God that will last forever?

With John, baptism was a symbol of repentance, which was meant to draw people toward Jesus. But with Jesus, Baptism allows the Holy Spirit to enter and dwell within a person, transforming the act from a symbol into a sacrament. The Holy Spirit is the driving force of goodness in the world, with enough power to take us all the way to Heaven.

John the Baptist was rough, and tough, and he took no guff. However, John's mission was one of preparation. He was the table setter. And we have all been invited to sit at that table by Jesus Himself, who is not only the Host, but the Feast!

As a Christian tradition, the wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

Each of the candles lit before Christmas represent an aspect of preparation during the season of Advent.

The First Week of Advent Represents: Hope

Candle Name: *the Prophecy Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church, it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent, we remember the Old Testament prophets who foretold of Jesus' coming with hope and anticipation.

The Second Week of Advent Represents: Peace and Preparation

Candle Name: *the Bethlehem Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: *the Shepherd's Candle* Candle Color: **Pink**

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

The Fourth Week of Advent Represents: Love

Candle Name: *the Angel's Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

Lighting Your Advent Wreath During the Week

Each day during the Fourth week of Advent, at the evening meal (or any time), light the first and second purple candles and the pink candle. The following prayers accompany the lighting of the candles.

All make the sign of the cross: **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.**

Someone at table reads the Scripture assigned to the liturgy of the day (one or both of the readings may be used).

Go to www.usccb.org to find the readings of the day. Then the Leader continues:

Leader: **Lift up your hearts.**

All respond: **We lift them up to the Lord.**

The Leader prays: **God, the Father of mercies, you willed your Son to take flesh, in order to give life back to us. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may wait in watchfulness for the glorious coming of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.**

After the meal, the Leader says: **Let us live soberly, justly, and devoutly in this world as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.**

All respond: **For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.**

From the Desk of Msgr. Walden

We can read about people and hear about people but the only way to really come to know others is to spend time with them. In the Gospel for today's Mass (John 1:6-8, 19-28), people are asking John the Baptist, "Who are you?" People were coming to him to have their sins washed away with a water ritual that was not what we call the Sacrament of Baptism. Quoting the prophet Isaias, John's reply was, "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the way of the Lord." As we go through our preparations for Christmas, that is a very clear reminder and call to recognize what we are celebrating and why we are celebrating.

As much as we are using a lot of energy to shop, send cards, wrap presents and schedule visits with one another, we can still be "in the desert" if we do not focus on why we are doing all this preparing. Like the people seeking out John the Baptist, like John the Baptist himself, we all have an inner thirst and hunger for God. In the first reading from last Sunday, we were encouraged by Isaias to "make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God." Without the foundation of faith and the conscious presence of God in our lives, we are in a "wasteland". We consume a lot of time and energy in a desert when we look to our electronic devices to entertain, amuse, and distract ourselves. Money can so easily become a source of concern with ever-rising prices. The gift of Jesus in our midst brings enrichment, purpose, and inspiration to us. The ultimate source of peace, purpose, meaning, and hope is in God, who has so wonderfully given us Himself the person to Jesus Christ, who became one with us in our humanity so we can become one with Him in His divinity. The first question to ponder is not how far I let Jesus Christ into my

life but how far He has let me into His life. All we have to do is find a quiet place, turn off all distractions, and speak to him attentively and prayerfully. In many ways, our prayers echo the words of the father seeking a cure from Jesus for his son who said, "I believe, help my unbelief." (Mark 9:24). We are not unbelievers, we are people of faith, hope, and love.

Advent is not so much a penitential season but a time of hope and joy. Isaias told a hungry world, as did John the Baptist, that God and his love was near not because we earned it but because God, in His all powerful love, is faithful. In Jesus Christ, God came Himself to free us from life without Him and walk with us on the journey of life to our ultimate destination and hope - eternal life with Him in heaven.

I offer the words of the Blessed Virgin Mary that we might know her joy in God love for her and all of us. (Luke 1:46-55)

*My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord,
my spirit rejoices in God my Savior;
for he has looked with favor on his lowly servant.
From this day all generations will call me blessed:
the Almighty has done great things for me,
and holy is his Name.
He has mercy on those who fear him
in every generation.
He has shown the strength of his arm,
he has scattered the proud in their conceit.
He has cast down the mighty from their thrones,
and has lifted up the lowly.
He has filled the hungry with good things,
and the rich he has sent away empty.
He has come to the help of his servant Israel,
for he has remembered his promise of mercy,
The promise he made to our fathers,
to Abraham and his children for ever.
Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy
Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for
ever. Amen.*

But joy is lasting, because it is given to us by God. Pleasure is taken, while joy is received.

From His Throne, to His Cradle, to His Cross, to His Altar, God never stops sharing the gift of His Love, and He gives us the opportunity to enter into that Love. Only in God's Love can we find true peace, and joy. Why would anyone refuse such a gift? If we (as human beings) were to fully comprehend the event that takes place on the altar at every mass, we would die of joy, because complete joy can only be experienced in Heaven. Joy is a gift from God.

Where is Joy?

It's not in a bank, or a chest filled with gold.

You can't store joy in a small glass jar,

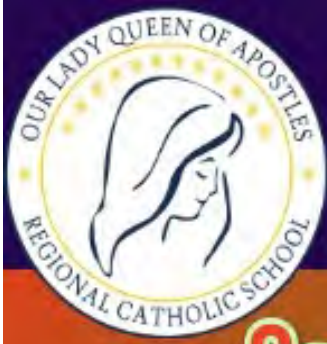

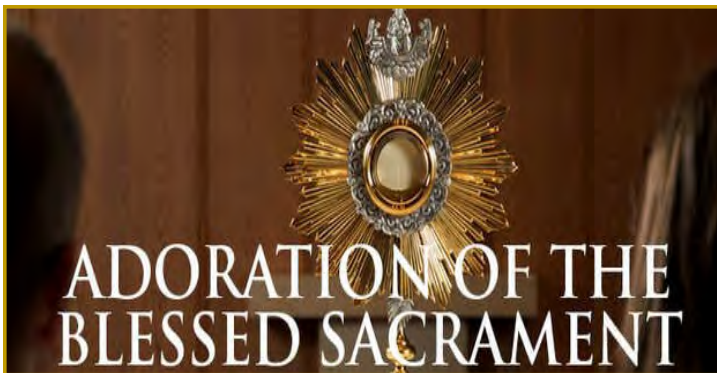

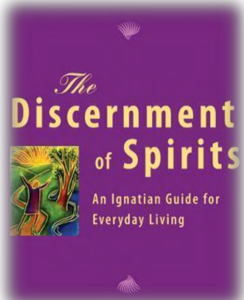

Women's Group...

Fr. Timothy Gallagher's book on The Discernment of Spirits, lists St. Ignatius' 14 rules for discernment, then goes through each rule a chapter at a time, describing how to apply it in our lives. In the ups & downs, consolations and desolations of our spiritual life, we go through times of pure joy to "Where are You Jesus?"



St. Ignatius (1491-1556), recuperating from war wounds was given reading material on the life of Christ & the saints. As he thought about what he read, he became aware of his thought patterns, how the thoughts affected his feelings, and how the good feelings remained with him. When he had worldly thoughts, although he felt good while thinking them, he noticed that afterward the feelings left him empty. He continued reading spiritual books, growing in wisdom. God was leading him, fulfilling His Plan for him to be a great saint & to teach us. God's plan for us is the same, the *process is slow*.

As women who love Jesus, we need & want to learn to recognize Jesus' voice & grow closer to Him. At times we feel inadequate, wondering is this Jesus speaking, me or the enemy? In our group we begin to see we're all equal, with the same problems, emotions, weaknesses, confusion, strengths, desires, fears, doing the best we can, we don't have to be perfect. Jesus consoles us through our love for each other. If you feel desire to come but are fearful, we understand because we've been there & at times still are, so just come as you are, no rules or requirements, you don't have to read or share. We respect the privacy of others, sharing is *anonymous*!
