

# A Message from our Pastor, Fr. Patrick...

# Fourth Sunday of Advent "Advent Prepares us for the Joy of Christmas"

In just a couple of days, it will be Christmas again. Yet, it is still Advent until Wednesday. Therefore, there is still some time left for us to prepare ourselves and our hearts for the great Christmas feast, in celebrating how God was faithful to His promise for humanity. Christmas reminds us of a better future with God. It reminds us of our greatest hope, life everlasting. Because of Christmas, a Savior has been born to us so that we may have eternal life. Christmas draws our attention directly to the Nativity scene where prophecy was fulfilled. It leads us directly to Christ who has brought the world the fullness of salvation. This is why we do Christmas big, because without Christmas, Jesus would not have entered the world to redeem humanity and restore us to wholeness.


**It is important** that we celebrate Christmas well because faith our completely dependent upon it. Our faith is centered around Christ who came to us on that first Holy Night to show us the path to salvation, a path that never ends. We do Christmas big all around the world because Christmas is everything. It is the greatest story ever told. All time and history are centered around the birth of Jesus because of the significance of His birth and what our Lord has accomplished. His birth brought us new hope and glad tidings. His birth changed the world. It brought us freedom and life everlasting!

So far, we have completed three full weeks of Advent, a time of renewal and spiritual growth and insight. If we take this season seriously, Advent allows us the opportunity to grow in our faith and trust in God. It helps us to reconnect with the Lord, especially through the scriptures and prayerful reflection. It is a time for us to be

restored in our hope in the gift of eternal life. It is a time for us to turn our lives around and redirect our attention back to God who is the source of hope and fulfillment in our lives. We are offered another opportunity to grow in our awareness and appreciation of the presence of God within our lives and to recall all that God has done for us

Advent also reminds us how God has remained patient and faithful to His promise for humanity, in bringing redemption to the entire world. Advent changes our outlook on life if we allow this season to embrace us in all of its simplicity and entirety. Advent awakens the hearts of all who are longing for truth and holiness. It opens for us the pathway to freedom and happiness. It invites us to open our hearts so that we can enter more deeply into the mysteries of God and experience the joy and hope that Christmas brings.

If Advent is all about preparing for the great Christmas feast and entering more deeply into the mysteries of God, then what are we expecting to get out of Christmas this year? What are we looking for? What are we really preparing for? Yes, it is important to prepare our homes for Christmas with decorations and to enjoy our family traditions of gathering together with our family around the tree and the Nativity. It is wonderful for us to exchange gifts for those who we hold close to our hearts. But if Christ is not at the center of our preparations during this new season of Advent, then something special and essential will be missing this Christmas. Christmas will come and go, and we will not feel any closer to Jesus than before Advent began.



The truth is, we spend a lot of time making so many preparations as we draw closer to another Christmas celebration. But how much time do we set aside in prayer and silence reflecting on the wonder of the Lord and the joy of His Nativity? How close are we to Jesus with less than one week to go until He comes to us on Christmas Day? There is so much going on in our lives and within our world that separates us from the Lord, and from living in peaceful communion with Him. There are so many activities going on right now that demand so much of our time and that pre-occupies our minds with worldly agendas and concerns. It is so hard to change our ways and become more prayerful, reflecting on the true meaning of Christmas when Christ came into this world to liberate us from bondage and to restore us to wholeness and everlasting life. It is so hard for us to find the time and effort to be still and silent in prayer before the Lord to reflect on the countless blessings we have received from Him in abundance.

If this Christmas is going to be more spiritual for us and less worldly, then now is the time for us to start zooming in on the Nativity scene and to begin reflecting on the wonder and the joy that Jesus wants to bring into our hearts once again. Now is the time, with just a few days to go, to make the effort to redirect our attention to the joy and the wonder that is always found in our Lord's Nativity, and feel the peace and joy that Christmas brings into our lives and homes.

I cannot help but think how unfortunate it was for those innkeepers that there was no room in their Inn for Joseph and Mary to give birth to Jesus. They lost out on the joy and wonder that came from that first Christmas. Let's not make the same mistake this new Christmas. There is still time left to open the Inn of our hearts for a special encounter with the Lord as we draw closer to another Christmas celebration. Let us open

our hearts today to invite the Lord once again to live among us and to be a big part of our lives each day. Let us prepare our hearts once again for the joy and wonder that Christmas brings!



I hope by now you have received my Christmas letter in the mail in support of our annual Christmas Appeal. I am so grateful for your continued prayers and generous support towards St. John's. 



# A Message from Monsignor Walden...


Christmas is a wonderful day and season to find hope, joy, gratitude, and wonder in our lives. One of the titles we use at Christmas is to call Jesus the Prince of Peace. We live in a world of international and national conflict people are dying and living fear. Personally, it is very hard and challenging to find peace when things do not go our way and we are disappointed. So many negative thoughts and scenarios go through our minds as we seek a winning answer for ourselves. That is exactly where we get lost as the darkness continues and negative thoughts bombard us. There are two conflicting thoughts that point to a solution. One is to prevail with self-righteous anger, spite, and vengeance. The other thought is to allow humility to calm us down, seek the truth and find the path to reconciliation and peace.

As we celebrate Christmas, we celebrate the birth of our Savior. What do we expect Him to save us from? What do we expect Him to save us for? Those are not the questions we should be focusing on. They all too easily turn us in on ourselves. The only way Jesus can and will be our Savior is to ponder what He wants to save us from and what He wants to save us for.

Jesus came 2000 years ago into a world that politically, messy socially religiously. There was no room for Him to be born in a place of human habitation. Yet the angels sang and the shepherds came and found the wonder of God Himself in the infant in the manger in a stable. Not only was there no room for Him at the inn, the petty ruler of that time, Herod, heard about His birth from the Magi who asked, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews?" The last thing Herod wanted was a threat who would take his place. In his murderous rage, he slaughtered the Holy Innocents causing Mary and Joseph to flee with the child Jesus into Egypt at the angel's bidding (Matthew 2:13-14). As an adult during His public ministry, Jesus, our Savior, angered the people of Nazareth where He lived as they led Him to the brow of a hill intending to throw Him down from it. (Luke 4:29). His response was simply humbling walking away.

To take the presence of Jesus seriously is the

same challenge, call, and privilege we have today. He is not a threatening, overbearing,

We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit,

in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

As a Christian tradition, the wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

Each of the candles lit before Christmas represent an aspect of preparation during the season of Advent.

#### <u>The First Week of Advent Represents:</u> Hope

Candle Name: the Prophecy Candle Color: Purple

Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church, it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent, we remember the Old Testament prophets who foretold of Jesus' coming with hope and anticipation.

#### The Second Week of Advent Represents: Peace and Preparation

Candle Name: the Bethlehem Candle Candle Color: Purple

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

#### The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: the Shepherd's Candle Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

#### The Fourth Week of Advent Represents: Love

Candle Name: *the Angel's Candle* Candle Color: **Purple** 

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

#### **Lighting Your Advent Wreath During the Week**

Each day during the Fourth week of Advent, at the evening meal (or any time), light the first and second purple candles and the pink candle. The following prayers accompany the lighting of the candles.

All make the sign of the cross: **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen**. Someone at table reads the Scripture assigned to the liturgy of the day (one or both of the readings may be used). Go to www.usccb.org to find the readings of the day. Then the Leader continues:

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

All respond: We lift them up to the Lord.

The Leader prays: God, the Father of mercies, you willed your Son to take flesh, in order to give life back to us. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may wait in watchfulness for the glorious coming of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen. After the meal, the Leader says: Let us live soberly, justly, and devoutly in this world as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

All respond: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

# Reduce your 2025 Taxes with a Charitable IRA Rollover!

Are you 70 1/2 or older with an IRA? Consider a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) of up to \$108,000 in 2025 to your parish or other ministry. Satisfy your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and keep more of your hard-earned retirement savings out of your taxable income. A QCD allows an IRA owner (and an IRA)

A QCD allows an IRA owner (and an IRA beneficiary) aged 70.5 or older to make charitable donations directly through their IRAs. IRA funds are transferred directly from the IRA to a qualified charitable organization. Most importantly, the funds withdrawn and transferred from the traditional IRA are not taxable. Normally, when a withdrawal is made from a traditional IRA, the withdrawal is considered a taxable event.

The best way for you to start is with your IRA custodian. Tell them you want to make a "qualified charitable distribution". In most cases you will only have to fill out a simple form.

VERY IMPORTANT!! Your gift must go directly from your IRA to the Charity. If you receive the money first, then you'll be taxed on it like any other distribution Beyond annual giving, an IRA Charitable Rollover can be a powerful tool for estate planning. Consider naming our organization as a beneficiary of your IRA, leaving a legacy of support that aligns with your values and lessening the tax burden on your heirs.
