Dear Parishioners;

Around this time of the year, I often think of how popular the Inn that turned away Mary and Joseph on the eve of the Messiah's birth would be today if the owner of the Inn accepted Mary and Joseph as their guests. The number of pilgrimages to this Inn over the last 2000-plus years would have been enormous just like those that have occurred in Bethlehem at that historic cave where Jesus was born.

Advent is a time for us to renew our hope and trust in the Lord. It is a time to open our hearts, the Inn of our hearts, to Jesus Christ. Advent is a time for spiritual growth; a time to grow in our relationship with the Lord. It is a time for us to open wide our hearts to welcome the One who brings us joy and glad tidings. It is a time to increase our faith and to receive Jesus with great joy and anticipation in His second coming. Hopefully, we are now ready to welcome Jesus again into our lives.

Too often, we are preoccupied or concerned with worldly figures, assets, and agendas and we forget about the presence of the Lord in our lives. We often forget how Jesus longs to be with us each day and how He comes to fill us with His peace and love; how He comes into our lives to reassure us and strengthen us in our faith. But, because our hearts are set elsewhere, we fail to welcome Him into our midst. Our hearts are closed and filled with so many worldly allurements that we have no room in the Inn of our hearts for Jesus.

Let us not make the same mistake that the Innkeepers made over 2000 years ago. If we do, Christmas will come and go, and we will not feel any closer to the Lord. Let us learn from their missed opportunity and not take this new season of Christmas for granted. This is a wonderful time of the year for us to prepare our hearts once again for the coming of the Lord. He will come among us in spirit, wonder and truth. He will come again without delay on December 25th. The question is, will the Inn of our hearts be ready to welcome Jesus with great joy, wonder and the appreciation of His complete love for humanity?

This year, as in the past, we will offer several Masses on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. The schedule for this year for Christmas Eve will be a 4 PM Mass in the Church and a 4 PM overflow Mass in the auditorium. We will also have a 6 PM evening Mass; a 9:30 PM evening Mass in Spanish; and a Midnight Mass in the Church. On Christmas Day, we will celebrate Mass at 8 AM, 10 AM, and 12 Noon in the Church. The music and the environment will be festive and beautiful. We hope to see you this Christmas!

Moreover, I ask that you please join me in supporting our Annual Christmas Appeal. We really rely on your generosity to continue the mission of the Church here at St. John the Evangelist. We as a parish provide many ministries in service to our community including the food pantry and Street Ministry. We also rely on your continued generosity so we can properly maintain our church and other facilities on our parish campus. I kindly ask, if your means allow, that you will be as generous as you can with our Christmas collection.

I hope and pray that this Christmas celebration will be more joyful and meaningful for you than ever before. May God bless you and your families. Have a blessed Christmas!

Christmas Letter from Our Bishop

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas to you and your families!

In recent years at Christmas, I have meditated on the relationship between the Nativity of the Prince of Peace and the Parable of the Good Samaritan.

I have been especially inspired by Pope Francis' analysis of the Parable of the Good Samaritan in the second chapter of his 2020 encyclical *Fratelli Tutti*. It is powerful and provocative, and I would recommend it for your mental prayer.

The short phrase in the Christmas Gospel narrative in the second chapter of the Gospel of Luke reads: "She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn."

"No room for them in the inn." No Good Samaritan stepped up to help the Holy Family. They were ignored and treated perfunctorily and impatiently. Some passed them by. Some pretended not to notice their plight.

Remember too that in the Parable of the Good Samaritan an "inn" is also mentioned. Luke 10 reads: "But a Good Samaritan while traveling came near him, and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn and took care of him."

The inn that the Holy Family approaches on the way to Bethlehem is a sign of rejection and indifference.

The inn in the Parable of the Good Samaritan is a sign of the Good Samaritan's compassion and commitment to go the extra mile and to make sure that the wounded man is taken care of until he is completely healed.

Contemporary literary criticism might very well emphasize that the use of "inn" by the Gospel writer in both the Nativity in Luke 2 and the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10 is not by accident.

In a sense, the phrase "there was no room at the inn" in the Nativity foreshadows and connects with the phrase in the Parable of the Good Samaritan describing the callous indifference of both the priest and the Levite toward the wounded man on the side of the road: "[H]e passed by on the other side."

As Pope Francis says in *Fratelli Tutti:* "Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders."1

Our Lady, St. Joseph and the unborn Christ Child experienced the reality of people who decided to be indifferent bystanders.

The Christmas Gospel narrative from Luke 2 poses a question which is posed again later in the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10.

Will we be Good Samaritans?

Or will we be indifferent bystanders?

As the Holy Father reminds us, we make that choice every day.

May our prayer, silent contemplation and creative family catechesis of the Nativity scene help us to be instruments of a Nativity Mystery. May the Good Samaritan Gospel revolution of humility, charity, mercy, tenderness and peace unite us in solidarity with the sick, the poor and the suffering, especially in the Middle East, Ukraine and all war-ravaged areas of the world.

May our commitment to "holiness and mission" bless our contemplative Synodal listening and our Eucharistic Revival and Evangelization.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

May the Light and Love of the Christ Child animate and guide our global Catholic Missionary Spirit on this Christmas night and throughout the New Year.

From the Desk of Msgr. Walden



One of the joyful experiences I have at this time of the year as I encounter children in school and in our church is asking them if they are going to get presents for their family for Christmas. Usually they say yes, and then I ask them what is the best gift they can give. I let them think about that for a few seconds and then point out them and say: "YOU are the best gift!" Their faces light up when they hear that. Christmas is about gifts and ultimately about the gift of God Himself in the

Christ child. Like all of us He came into our world just as we do - as a precious child bringing joy and wonder to His parents. How amazing that the God of all creation was so humble in His love for us to come as a defenseless child who changed not only the lives of Mary and Joseph but of countless people since then, and thankfully we are included. There was no room in the inn for His birth, which shows the purity of the power of His loving presence.

With all the acronyms and abbreviations we use when we text one another, I take the word GIFT and use it as an acronym to remind us that God Is Forever There or God Is Forever Thine. The Christmas decorations we use to brighten our homes at this time of the year point beyond themselves to an almost unbelievable reality - in Jesus, God has come into our world with His creative, redemptive, and unconditional love to bring us into His life and into unity with one another. Not only do we have the gift of God Himself in Jesus, we are invited to be fully a part of His life. What a gift we are given when He says, stretching out his hand toward his disciples, "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of my heavenly Father is my brother, and sister, and mother to me." (Matthew 12:49-50) What is the will of the Father? To do what Jesus said and did, "I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (Matthew 13:34-35)

As we celebrate the birth of Jesus and contemplate His presence in the manger in the stable in Bethlehem, may we all recognize the gift we are to God, and through Him the gift we are to one another.

Luke 2:15-20: "When the angels went away from them to heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go, then, to Bethlehem to see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went in haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the infant lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known the message that had been told them about this child. All who heard it were amazed by what had been told them by the shepherds. And Mary kept all these things, reflecting on them in her heart. Then the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, just as it had been told to them."

Fourth Sunday of Advent

2 Sm 7:1-5, 8b-12, 14a, 16 | Rom 16:25-27 | Lk 1:26-38

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you." The angel Gabriel announces this in the Gospel today, and it is a phrase with which we are all familiar thanks to our recitation of the Hail Mary prayer. Although some may be comforted by such a message and its angelic messenger, it is troubling to Mary because the angel goes on to tell her she will conceive and bear the Son of God. Thinking practically, Mary is being told the impossible will happen - who wouldn't be troubled? And yet Mary offers herself: "I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Despite her fear and trepidation, Mary went on to answer God's call and do his will. Our Blessed Mother became a great example of fortitude at that moment, as she exemplified what it means to step outside of our own uncertainty and trust God completely. Although doing God's will can be difficult at times, St. Paul reminds us in his Letter to the Romans that we can ask God for the strength to say "yes" in spite of our fears.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Up until today, December has probably been a whirlwind. Trees and lights, ornaments, parties and presents - all these things help to kick off "the most wonderful time of year" beginning soon after Thanksgiving. Come Dec. 26, however, for many, the decorations become a nuisance and Christmas trees are out on the curb for pickup. Thank goodness for our Catholic faith because for us, Christmas is just beginning! Mary didn't say "may it be done to me" only to forget about it the next day. No, in the coming months, the Blessed Mother nurtured the baby Jesus in her womb, anticipating the arrival of her firstborn and the Son of God. And on that blessed Christmas night, her work as the Mother of God was only just beginning. So, as we anticipate the arrival of the Christ Child, we are joyful that our Christmas season continues until we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord on January 8. Let us use this time to draw closer to God and make every effort in the new year to do his will.

SING Angels, announce with shouts of mirth Christ who brings new life to earth. Set every peak and valley humming With the word, the Lord is coming. People, look east and sing today: Love, the Lord, is on the way.

As a Christian tradition, the wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

Each of the candles lit before Christmas represent an aspect of preparation during the season of Advent.

The First Week of Advent Represents: Hope

Candle Name: *the Prophecy Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church, it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent, we remember the Old Testament prophets who foretold of Jesus' coming with hope and anticipation.

The Second Week of Advent Represents: Peace and Preparation

Candle Name: *the Bethlehem Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: *the Shepherd's Candle* Candle Color: **Pink**

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

The Fourth Week of Advent Represents: Love

Candle Name: *the Angel's Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

Lighting Your Advent Wreath During the Week

Each day during the Fourth week of Advent, at the evening meal (or any time), light the first and second purple candles and the pink candle. The following prayers accompany the lighting of the candles.

All make the sign of the cross: **In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen**. Someone at table reads the Scripture assigned to the liturgy of the day (one or both of the readings may be used). Go to <u>www.usccb.org</u> to find the readings of the day. Then the Leader continues:

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

All respond: We lift them up to the Lord.

The Leader prays: God, the Father of mercies, you willed your Son to take flesh, in order to give life back to us. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may wait in watchfulness for the glorious coming of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

After the meal, the Leader says: Let us live soberly, justly, and devoutly in this world as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

All respond: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.



What We've Been up to...






times of pure joy to "Where are You Jesus?"

St. Ignatius (1491-1556), recuperating from war wounds was given reading material on the life of Christ & the saints. As he thought about what he read, he became aware of his thought patterns, how the thoughts affected his feelings, and how the good feelings remained with him. When he had worldly thoughts, although he felt good while thinking them, he noticed that afterward the feelings left him empty. He continued reading spiritual books, growing in wisdom. God was leading him, fulfilling His Plan for him to be a great saint & to teach us. God's plan for us is the same, the process is slow.

As women who love Jesus, we need & want to learn to recognize Jesus' voice & grow closer to Him. At times we feel inadequate, wondering is this Jesus speaking, me or the enemy? In our group we begin to see we're all equal, with the same problems, emotions, weaknesses, confusion, strengths, desires, fears, doing the best we can, we don't have to be perfect. Jesus consoles us through our love for each other. If you feel desire to come but are fearful, we understand because we've been there & at times still are, so just come as you are, no rules or requirements, you don't have to read or share. We respect the privacy of others, sharing is anonymous!
