A Reflection from Deacon Ed Grieb ...

Second Sunday of Advent (Matthew 3:1-12)

'I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I... He will Baptize you with the Holy Spirit and Fire'

Today's Gospel reading reminds us that this season of Advent is more than just a warm-up period to our Christmas celebration of the birth of Jesus. Advent, like Lent, is also penitential in nature, a time when we reflect on our lives and consider what changes may be necessary as we wait for His promised second coming, a "New Heavens and a New Earth," as spoken of in the Book of Revelation.

Advent, derived from the Latin 'ad-venire', means 'to come.' Advent has a two-fold meaning to us in our faith. First, we prepare for the celebration of the Nativity of the Lord's Birth some 2000 years ago and what that means to each of us; but, secondly, we also prepare ourselves for His next coming. It's in this preparation that we take inventory of ourselves and our life, opening our hearts to ready ourselves as we look for Christ alive in our presence and allow the Holy Spirit to guide us on this path of repentance. And it's in this second coming that we see the source of our Christian Hope – that God will bring all things to fulfillment in Him.

"When He comes again in glory and majesty and all at last is made manifest, may we watch for that day...inherit the great promise in which now we dare to HOPE."

- Preface I of Advent

Our 1st reading today from the Prophet Isaiah gives us a glimpse into our Christian Hope. A Hope that we share with our Jewish sisters and brothers. Isaiah's words reveal to us that world that is to come. As Christians, we see the realization of these promises in Jesus Himself as He establishes the beginnings of His Kingdom here on earth, and we also know in faith that it will be fully realized in the world to come. Our

passage today from Isaiah is from a time when the Jewish nation is all but in ruin as the result of an unworthy

king, and so Isaiah compares it to a stump of a tree, one that no longer has branches nor bears leaves or fruit. But all is not lost, and he prophesizes that from this stump a great leader will blossom, God's anointed One.

St. Paul reminds us in a passage from his Letter to the Romans that it is through Holy Scripture that we find the encouragement for hope. When we read scripture, we not only find instruction and guidance for our faith, but also the inspiration to carry it through in our actions. And when we do, we will find ourselves working toward building God's Kingdom in our world.

Our passage from Matthew's Gospel today is a call to hope by John the Baptist, that the coming of the Messiah is at hand, and time is now to repent...to see in ourselves what it is we need to change. Though John the Baptist has harsh words for the Jewish temple leaders, we hear how many others were in fact listening and following John's call. It's a reminder for us to ask ourselves, have we accepted Jesus into our hearts, like those that were following John the Baptist? Do we hear and listen to the call to repentance? Though we face difficulties and challenges in living out our Christian lives in a society that largely does not accept Him, we know that Jesus is there to walk with us in love, helping us make those changes that are necessary.

The Jubilee Year of 2025 in our Church, with its theme "Pilgrims of Hope," will end later this month. In announcing the Jubilee last year, Pope Francis invited the faithful to embrace HOPE, calling it "a virtue which must be sourced above all in the grace of God and in the fullness of His mercy." May we all have a blessed Advent season, and may the Holy Spirit enkindle in us a spirit of Hope that allows us to open our hearts to the loving presence of Jesus in our lives.








A Message from Monsignor Walden...

Our spiritual preparation for Christmas at all need to find peace in our times can be put on the back burner as we send cards, buy gifts, and arrange and attend joyful family, gatherings with friends, coworkers. Our spiritual preparation is called the season of Advent. In contrast to the season of Lent where we focus on sacrifices, prayer, devotions, and good works, the season of Advent is a time that is permeated with joyful thoughts of being enriched and enriching one another with our physical gifts and our physical presence. In the Gospel for today's Mass (Matthew 3:1-12) we have these words from John the Baptist: "Repent for the kingdom of heaven is at Hand!" All of the gifts and gatherings are really an opportunity to remind ourselves of what a gift it is to be loved and to love one another, which then points to and opens our minds and hearts to God's love for us. Every time and place we share the love in our hearts with our time, presence, and undivided attention we are embracing the season of Advent.

But the real key is to focus on what Christmas is really all about. The commercial celebration of Christmas has a traditional beginning with the Friday after Thanksgiving (Black Friday) where the stores open wide their doors and the on line deals for physical gifts seek our attention. This is a very important time for the monetary side of Christmas. what is it that we do spiritually to get ready? Of course we are faithful to daily prayer and Sunday Mass. We also have the opportunity for the Sacrament of Penance of the Monday before Christmas as there will be priests in every parish in our diocese, including our own St. John the Evangelist, where confessions will be heard. In reality in our parish we offer the Sacrament of Penance after every weekday mass, on Saturdays from 4:00-5:00 PM, and on Sunday evening at 5:30. Confession is not a sacrament that readily comes to mind when we think of preparing for Christmas, but is one of the wonderful gifts we

hearts and to once again experience the joy inspiration of



merciful love. The birth of our Savior in the Christ Child is a powerful sign and reality of the love experienced in our humble, mercy filled, encounter with Jesus. The gift of His presence is a gift of pure, unconditional, life giving, merciful love.

Jesus is the Son of God who almost unbelievably humbled Himself and came into our world as one of us. He was born in a stable because there was no room for Him at the inn. He did not come to rule over us but to invite us into His life and to be invited into ours. Giving Him our time, attention, and presence throughout the Advent Season and everyday of our lives is exactly the gift He came to experience as He continues to give us His time, attention and presence. He is the present and presence we all seek and we are the present and presence He seeks.

I conclude with the RENEW 2000 prayer which is a beautiful expression of what Advent and the gift of Jesus is all about as well as the gift we are to Him and one another.

Gracious God and Father, We are your people embraced by your love. We thank you for your presence with us throughout all time.

As we celebrate over 2000 years since the birth of Jesus, your Son: Create us anew. Liberate us from all that keeps us from you. Send your Holy Spirit, enabling us to recreate our world and restore justice.

Heal us from every form of sin and violence. Transform us to live your Word more profoundly. Reconcile us so enemies, become friends. Awaken us to the sacred: Nurture our relationships;

Enliven our parishes; reunite our families. Fill us with joy to celebrate the fullness of life. Empower us to be a community of love growing in your likeness by the grace of Christ our Lord. Amen.

As a Christian tradition, the wreath holds the four Advent candles. The candles represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit. As Christmas draws nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness. Sometimes a white candle is lit on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day to symbolize that Jesus is with us. This can be referred to as the "Christ candle."

Each of the candles lit before Christmas represent an aspect of preparation during the season of Advent.

The First Week of Advent Represents: Hope

Candle Name: *the Prophecy Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the

Catholic Church, it symbolizes penance, preparation, and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent, we remember the Old Testament prophets who foretold of Jesus' coming with hope and anticipation.



The Second Week of Advent Represents: Peace and Preparation

Candle Name: the Bethlehem Candle Candle Color: Purple

During this second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versionsof-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming. We remember the journey Joseph and Mary took from Nazareth to Bethlehem.

The Third Week of Advent Represents: Joy

Candle Name: the Shepherd's Candle Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

The Fourth Week of Advent Represents: Love

Candle Name: *the Angel's Candle* Candle Color: **Purple**

During this final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son. We reflect on the good news of God's love brought to us from the angel Gabriel.

Lighting Your Advent Wreath During the Week

Each day during the Fourth week of Advent, at the evening meal (or any time), light the first and second purple candles and the pink candle. The following prayers accompany the lighting of the candles. All make the sign of the cross: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. Someone at table reads the Scripture assigned to the liturgy of the day (one or both of the readings may be used). Go to www.usccb.org to find the readings of the day. Then the Leader continues:

Leader: Lift up your hearts.

All respond: We lift them up to the Lord.

The Leader prays: God, the Father of mercies, you willed your Son to take flesh, in order to give life back to us. Bless these your gifts with which we are about to nourish our bodies, so that, receiving new strength, we may wait in watchfulness for the glorious coming of Christ. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

After the meal, the Leader says: Let us live soberly, justly, and devoutly in this world as we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

All respond: For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.

For You Too Were Once Aliens...

A STATEMENT BY THE CATHOLIC BISHOPS OF NEW YORK STATE

November 13, 2025 | Memorial of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini



Leviticus 19:33-34

"When an alien resides with you in your land, do not mistreat such a one. You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; you shall love the alien as yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt."

In September, a striking mural depicting immigrants of the past and present was dedicated at Saint Patrick's Cathedral in Manhattan. Among the multitude of those immigrants now gracing the narthex walls of our venerable metropolitan cathedral – nameless men and women who came to this land often "tired...poor...[and] yearning to be free" – stands a young Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini.

Mother Cabrini, a woman consecrated to the Lord, was an indefatigable advocate, protector, and educator of newly arrived immigrants to New York. A native of Italy, she overcame anti-Italian prejudice in her adopted country of America and established, with God's grace, numerous charitable institutions and schools to serve those finding their way in a new land.

Mother Cabrini reminds us of the Church's longstanding care and concern for immigrants, as the mural itself, stunning in its scope, illustrates an indisputable fact: New York was and is a land of immigrants whose contributions have enriched and transformed, indeed built, our society.

Contemplating this magnificent mural at a moment when our nation considers again the plight of the immigrant, we recall that Christian charity, as lived so powerfully by Mother Cabrini, demands we welcome the stranger and treat every individual with respect and dignity.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church makes this clear.

"The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him."

"Political authorities, for the sake of the common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens." (n. 2241)

Pope Leo XIV, like his predecessors, has already taught this truth and shown particular solicitude towards migrant refugees—those who leave their homes not simply to seek a better life abroad, but who are forced to take flight because of violence and oppression in their own nations. In his first apostolic exhortation, *Dilexi Te*, proclaimed on October 4, 2025, the Memorial of Saint Francis of Assisi, he wrote:

"The Church, like a mother, accompanies those who are walking. Where the world sees threats, she sees children; where walls are built, she builds bridges. She knows that her proclamation of the Gospel is credible only when it is translated into gestures of closeness and welcome. And she knows that in every rejected migrant, it is Christ himself who knocks at the door of the community." (Section 75)

In recent years, many such refugee migrants have come to New York. Some have arrived from war-torn countries like Ukraine and Afghanistan; others from Central or South America have fled poverty, authoritarian governments, and drug cartels that made life in their country of origin dangerous for themselves and their families. Some have been granted refugee or temporary protected status, while others have no legal status. Most of these migrants – the majority, our neighbors – are good people who arrived on our shores seeking a better life.

Sadly, as in any group, some have exploited the system and committed serious crimes and other misdeeds. Those immigrants or refugees who commit crimes should face the appropriate criminal and civil penalties, including deportation. At the same time, general enforcement of the immigration laws must be carried out in a humane manner that does not target the hard-working and law-abiding; that does not permit the wanton and unnecessary separation of families; and that does not rely on campaigns of fear that cripple whole communities.

As such, we do not support the sweeping revocation of the temporary protected status that was granted to many migrants who arrived in this country to escape the horrors occurring in their own, and who have justifiably relied upon the legal protections our government offered to them. Such persons should not be subject to the arbitrary cancellation of their legal status and threatened with a sudden return to the troubled and dangerous nations from which they fled. At the same time, while we support the right to peacefully protest and witness opposition to political policies, we can never condone violence against immigration and law enforcement agents.

Before the complex questions of immigration, we maintain, without question, that our government has a duty to secure our borders and ensure that those who wish to enter the United States do so lawfully. In union with our brother Bishops across the United States, we have consistently urged our civil leaders to craft immigration laws that respect our borders and create an orderly process for those who wish to enter our nation, while offering a measure of forgiveness towards those who arrived here without legal status but who have proven their contributions and loyalty to our country over a period of time.

These are all good points to ponder. However, most important to recall is the law of Christ set down in the Great Commandments: To love God with all our hearts and to love our neighbor as ourselves. All other imperatives are subject to this law of charity, and it is concerned neither with legal status nor country of origin. As individuals and as a society, we are bound to follow this supreme command and to make all our actions consistent with it, to the best of our abilities, even in difficult circumstances.

Returning to the example of Mother Cabrini, the Bishops of the United States have called on Catholics in all walks of life to stand in solidarity with immigrants and refugees by signing *The Cabrini Pledge*, *an Invitation to be Keepers of Hope*. We encourage New York Catholics to sign the pledge. By doing so, you will follow in the footsteps of our beloved Mother Cabrini in acknowledging our duty to welcome, to protect, to promote, and to integrate immigrants in accordance with the guidance proclaimed by Sacred Scripture and the Magisterium of the Church.

Reduce your 2025 Taxes with a Charitable IRA Rollover!

Are you 70 1/2 or older with an IRA? Consider a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) of up to \$108,000 in 2025 to your parish or other ministry. Satisfy your Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) and keep more of your hard-earned retirement savings out of your taxable income.

A QCD allows an IRA owner (and an IRA beneficiary) aged 70.5 or older to make charitable donations directly through their IRAs. IRA funds are transferred directly from the IRA to a qualified charitable organization. Most importantly, the funds withdrawn and transferred from the traditional IRA are not taxable. Normally, when a withdrawal is made from a traditional IRA, the withdrawal is considered a taxable event.

The best way for you to start is with your IRA custodian. Tell them you want to make a "qualified charitable distribution". In most cases you will only have to fill out a simple form.

VERY IMPORTANT!! Your gift must go directly from your IRA to the Charity. If you receive the money first, then you'll be taxed on it like any other distribution

Beyond annual giving, an IRA Charitable Rollover can be a powerful tool for estate planning. Consider naming our organization as a beneficiary of your IRA, leaving a legacy of support that aligns with your values and lessening the tax burden on your heirs.




