

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Letting Go of the Nets

Dear Parish Family:

I love to read. One of my problems it that if I read one book and that author cites or recommends another book I usually get that book and then if that author recommends a book I get that book....and well they start to fill up my bookshelf. I wish I could say I get to them all. It's a work in progress.

In reading a book recently the author recommended a writer I have always found challenging and, honestly, overwhelming—Henri Nouwen. He died a number of years ago but efforts have been made to go through his writings. The latest book entitled, *Following Jesus: Finding Our Way Home in an Age of Anxiety*, has pushed, prodded and pulled me. There are times I read certain sentences and I have to catch my breath. You probably have a few authors like that too.

Fear and anxiety are inevitable, I suppose. There are times we are stopped in our tracks. Now what? Where do I turn? How do I take the next step? How will I ever get through this? Over the past few years I find I struggle more with anxiety than I care to admit. Part of it is the responsibility of the work I am involved with. Part of it is that I probably care too much. Part of it is that the unknown is already a little fearful. Part of it—and probably the largest part—I don't trust enough.

Writing about a similar passage to today's Gospel, Nouwen writes, "The disciples had a mentality of scarcity and so do we...when we are concerned that there isn't enough, our first response is to start hoarding. We start hoarding the bread, the fish. Hoarding honor. Hoarding affection (people/ relationships), hoarding knowledge. Hoarding ideas" (38-39).

Are you a hoarder? I'm not. I give things away. I don't have a lot stuff (except the books!). Or am I a hoarder after all? Do I hold on to too much of what I am about or who is in my life or my status or position or whatever it may be? Truthfully, if I am holding on to those things there is often no room for me to grab on to Christ.

So you know the next step, right? Letting go. Speaking of himself he says, "If I hold on to a friend or if I hold on to an idea, I find myself anxious and nervous. Why do I choose this? Do something different! Something happens. Something totally new" (42).

I do not know if I want something new. Sometimes fear and anxiety almost become too comfortable, become what we're used to living with. How can I not be possessive or afraid or overwhelmed or fearful?

What's the answer? It's in verse 19 of the gospel passage— "Come after me...". It is not about imitation. It is not about dramatic turns. It is not about self righteous behavior. It is not about turning to a different time and place. Simply it is "about a movement that comes from the heart...from the deepest place of our person" (47). It is not a cookie-cutter response. It is a unique response for each of us.

For some it might mean getting out of a boat or dropping our nets. For others it is giving space to someone we love. For others it is letting go of something we are working so hard to control. For others it is about looking to the Lord instead of everywhere else. It is about asking Jesus to help us find our own unique way to fully follow, to fully trust Him.

In the school, we teach a lot about being a leader, not a follower. It's a good concept and important for each one of us to consider in this world in which we live. In the spiritual life perhaps a little bit more following (and trusting) and a little less leading (and managing) might bring us some peace. It might just set us free.

Please pray for me. I promise the same.

THE SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD



"The relationship between the Risen Lora, the community of benevers and sucrea Scripture is essential to our identity as Christians. Without the Lord who opens our minds to them, it is impossible to understand the Scriptures in depth. Yet the control is equally true: without the Scriptures, the events of the mission of Jesus and of his Church in this world would remain incomprehensible. Hence, Saint Jerome could "The relationship between the Risen Lord, the community of believers and sacred Scripture is essential to our identity as Christians. Without the Lord who opens our minds to them, it is impossible to understand the Scriptures in depth. Yet the contrary rightly claim: "Ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ" (Commentary on the Book of Isaiah, Prologue: PL 24,17B)."

On the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, Pope Francis called us to focus on the Word of God. While this does not overtake the liturgical day, it calls us in a special way to focus on the importance of the Scripture in our lives as Catholics. (It's similar to Divine Mercy Sunday, for example. We still celebrate the 2nd Sunday of Easter but have a particular focus on the divine mercy of God.)

It is a good day for us to consider how significant the Bible is in our own lives – if at all. It is important to remember that "the Church has always venerated the divine Scriptures just as she venerates the body of the Lord, since, especially in the sacred liturgy, she unceasingly receives and offers to the faithful the bread of life from the table both of God's word and of Christ's body" (Dei Verbum 21). Aware of God's presence in the Word, do we

- Give honor to God's Word?
- Have a Bible?
- Read the Scriptures to better know God's revelation?
- Pray with the Scriptures, perhaps praying with the reading of the day?
- Let the Word touch each of our senses?
- Listen to the Word proclaimed at Mass?
- Allow ourselves to become distracted?

Perhaps these are some good things to consider this weekend as well as how we might grow more and more in love with the Word of God.

Beginning this weekend, you will notice a great attention paid to the Word of God at our liturgical celebrations. In the weeks ahead we will begin using the **Book of the Gospels**. This book contains all of the Gospel passages we use at Sunday liturgies and on solemnities. You may have noticed that we use it during Confirmation and during the Sacred Paschal

Triduum. This will take some time to get used to but it will be an opportunity for us, as a parish, to better focus on the Word of God, most especially in the proclamation of the Gospel.

It really will not change too much at Mass. The reader will walk in with this book during the procession and place it on the altar. During the Gospel acclamation (Alleluia or another acclamation that is used during Lent), the priest or deacon will take the book from the altar and process with it to the Ambo. It is an opportunity for us to give greater reverence to God's Word during the Liturgy of the Word.

You know the hope, right? The hope is what we do at Mass will correlate to how we practice our faith. We hope the greater reverence of the Word of God at Mass may help us to better reverence the Word of God outside of Mass by both reading the Bible and putting its words into action!

The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord — This Thursday, February 2

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in sight of all the peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." - Luke 2:29-32



The Presentation of the Lord pulls many favorite mementos from the Catholic cupboard: candles, blessings, Christmas, and church. The Mass of February 2 begins with a blessing of lighted candles held by the faithful, who glow with the memory of the birth of Jesus. The origins of the feast lie in ancient Jewish custom. On the 40th day after childbirth, parents brought the infant to the Temple to present it to the Lord and to purify the mother. St. Luke tells us that Joseph and Mary sacrificed two birds for the occasion after the birth of Jesus. Count up 40 days after Christmas and you'll come to February 2.

Until the 1960s, we used to call this day "The Purification of Mary." The title changed for several reasons. We no longer believe that women who give birth need purification, and the true significance of the feast concerns Jesus coming to the Temple. He is the Promised One, whose light will shine, beaming rays of hope to all the world. Also on the old calendar, this feast closed the Christmas season. Now we end the Christmas season with the Baptism of the Lord. So, even though the date for the Presentation still depends on Christmas, it has become a feast of Ordinary Time.

The candles remind us of the words that the prophet Simeon used when he said that Jesus was a light for the nations. You may bring candles from your home. We invite you to take a set of Candlemas candles home and use them for special occasions. They will be available after all the Masses and after that in the rectory. We ask for a \$5 offering to cover the cost of the candles.

Why is it that so few seniors sign up for activities that we offer here at the Church? I know some of us wait until the last minute but if I am not offering things that entice you, perhaps you can suggest something that you'd like

Soon we will be starting a new support group for those who have lost a loved one through death or divorce and although those two areas seem dissimilar it is amazing that often they are not. If you are hurting and people (friends, family) tell you that you should "be over it" they do not really understand the emotions involved in loss. A support group is just that—those present understand and will not expect you to speak if you are not comfortable; but everyone understands and will NEVER discourage your feelings. Since we do use a journal book, a number attending is important.

Perhaps you have seen the notice of a one-day retreat of *Walking with Mary during Lent*. Since lunch is included, a number is important.

Our Thursday morning group (which meets on the 2nd and 4th Thursday) at 10:00 in the IHM Room of the convent, will begin the 4th Thursday of January. We will be reading *God Isn't Finished With Me Yet*, by Barbara Lee, a book helping us to discover the spiritual graces of later life.

Having trouble with balance? Try our Tuesday morning T'ai Chi Che for 40 minutes. It does wonders!

We will also have Stations of the Cross on Fridays during Lent in Seton Chapel. Time will be given next week.

Do you love to iron? Do great things with a can of starch? Love laundry?


Then, the ALTAR SOCIETY might be for you!

PRAYER AND WORSHIP



LITURGICAL PRACTICES, GOOD HEALTH AND COMMON SENSE!

My former Pastor, Msgr. Joseph DeGrocco, a former professor of liturgy at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, prepared a brief article for my former parish's bulletin that runs during the winter months. With his permission, I have reprinted it here. As we are in the midst of the winter season, there are some good things to consider in our celebration of the Eucharist.

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these winter days, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- <u>Holy Communion</u>: Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion are especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before coming into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).
- <u>Communion from the Chalice</u>: The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.
- <u>Receiving on the Tongue:</u> Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick; receive Communion in the hand instead.
- <u>Greeting of Peace:</u> Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.
- <u>Mass Attendance</u>: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. (Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick.) Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.
