A Message from the Coordinator of Family Ministry...

It's not just a question for lepers!



Although the readings today revolve around leprosy and how it was dealt with thousands of years ago, when we go deeper, we see that these scriptures target key spiritual truths that can beautifully usher us into a

Our first reading comes from the book of Leviticus. This book delineates the required priestly responses to ordinary matters. The purpose of these

regulations was to ensure that the people of Israel would live a life centered on God. It was the responsibility of the priest to examine a person and determine whether or not the person had a diagnosis of "leprosy". If leprosy was confirmed, the person afflicted was required to live in public disgrace and exclusion, until such time that the condition was resolved, and the person was reexamined by the priest and determined "clean". Leprosy was considered a punishment from God. A few years ago, I learned a little bit more about leprosy during the times when the scriptures were written. I was quite surprised. The Hebrew word "saraat", often translated as leprosy, does not refer to the same disease that we know today as leprosy or Hansen's disease. It was more of a general term that encompassed a variety of visible skin conditions including things like ringworm, smallpox, measles, etc. Imagine... being banished because of ringworm? Hold that thought!

In the second reading, St. Paul presents a simple, but challenging, premise which should govern our words and actions. "Will what I am about to do bring glory to God? Will what I say offend God or His people in any way? Will my words and actions be beneficial for others? In a nutshell, "Am I imitating Christ?" St. Paul's main concern is our salvation, and he provides a very clear guide to decisionmaking. Nothing confusing about that... but it requires humility, prayer, discipline, and surrender. Keep this idea in mind as we look at the gospel.

Today's gospel reading comes from the gospel of Mark and recalls for us the familiar story of Jesus healing the leper. It is a short, powerful reminder of the compassionate mercy of Christ. The leper who comes to Jesus has much to teach us. He comes to Jesus and says, "If you will, you can make me clean." He acknowledges that his healing rests in the hands of Christ. He surrenders himself to the will of God. He asks Jesus to "make him clean". Those words are carefully chosen. Being made clean... is different than being healed. Being healed would rid him of his disease, but being made clean would allow him to return to his family and to his community, to regain his life. And we know what happens... in his mercy, Jesus does just what the leper asks of him.

Jesus' response brings restoration to that leper and reassurance to all of us. Jesus reached out to the leper who was deemed an outcast...sinful...unworthy...unclean. Ever feel like that? I know I have. But that loving hand of Christ is extended to every one of us. We only need to...humbly acknowledge that our healing rests in Him; expose our "sores" with complete truth; and allow Him to touch us... without pulling back, turning away, or avoiding His mercy.

So, as we begin our Lenten journey let us ask ourselves, "Am I clean or unclean?" I think we all know the truth. We may not have leprosy or Hansen's disease, but each of us has our own "spiritual leprosy" that keeps us from experiencing the fullness of life with God. Lent sends us a beautiful invitation to kneel before the Lord and beg Him to, "Make me clean!" Perhaps we can use today's readings as an examination of conscience.

From Leviticus: Am I living a God-centered life according to the commandments?

Have I judged others based upon what I see (or what I think I see) or based on what I hear (or I think I hear)?

Have I overexaggerated something that resulted in hurting someone else (misdiagnosing ringworm as leprosy!).

Have I banished others spiritually, physically, or emotionally?

From Corinthians: What are the deciding factors that govern the words and actions of my life? Glory to God? Benefit of others?

From the gospel: Do I truly acknowledge that everything is in God's hands? Or am I in control?

Will I make myself vulnerable before the Lord and expose my oozing, recurring, embarrassing, disgraceful "sores"?

Will I kneel before the Lord and beg for healing?

Will I allow the loving hand of Christ to touch me? Will I reach out to take hold of mercy and forgiveness?

This is just one way to "Repent and believe in the gospel." Whatever we choose to do during the days and weeks ahead, let's support each other. Let's pray each other through Lent. Let's allow ourselves to be cleansed of our spiritual leprosy.

And by Easter Sunday... let's pray that we're all squeaky clean!

ABSTINENCE & FASTING

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent.

All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Ash Wednesday and Good Friday fast and abstinence.





A Message from Msgr. Walden...

As all of America knows today is Super Bowl Sunday. Sports certainly gets a lot of hype and attention is our society. This coming Wednesday is Ash Wednesday, a day noted for people coming to have ashes placed on our foreheads as the words "Repent and believe" in the Gospel are spoken over us. Ash Wednesday is the beginning of our forty day journey to the ultimate Sunday of the year, Easter Sunday. As Ash Wednesday begins it is good to think about where we are in our life with God as individuals and as the Church.

We live in a world and a nation with much dissension and division. How can we break down barriers, talk with one another, and be reconciled? The only true source of hope and way to peace comes from the author of life and His Son Jesus Christ. There is no other Way, Truth, or Life. No one and nothing has what only our God can give us. A few weeks ago in a spiritual book, "St. Paul Speaks to Priests" by John Gilchrist, I am reading and using to pray at morning prayer I read this passage over and over again: "St. Paul spent his entire Christian life in conflict. Yet, he asks us to strive for peace, while at the same time admonishing us to "see to it" that no one falls away from grace. People who are being tempted by evil are in a situation of stress. An alcoholic does not want to hear about abstinence. A man in an adulterous relationship does not want to be told about morality. The sad plight of today's society has come from its abandonment of God. The poison of secularism leads men and women with a worthless value system. The sickness infects all of their hopes and dreams. Their value system is worthless because it begins with the world and ends with the world. Our peace comes from a pure heart that sees all things as God's and all people as creatures of God."

The forty days of Lent is our God given time to refocus on who and what is important in our lives. Yes, it is about where we allow God to fit into our lives. But first and foremost is about being reawakened and renewed by how God allows us to fit into His life. As common sense points out and as we know all too well relationships only grow and give life when we put our minds, hearts, and souls into them. We think about what we are going to give up as a penance during Lent. But what do we

really have to give up to spend more time in sincere prayer, reception of Jesus in Holy Communion, and being uplifted by His words of



forgiveness in the Sacrament of Penance? Would that we would spend 10% of the time we spend with our electronic devices every day praying sincerely and prayerfully reflecting on the Scriptures. A very "holy" thing we can do on our phone, iPad or computer is go on the site USCCB (United Staters Conference of Catholic Bishops). It quickly makes available the readings for Mass each day and all the books of the Bible. I use it frequently, especially when I am writing a column such as this. Even google is so helpful. I type in "where In the Bible does Jesus say..." and in a second or two the passage comes up.

Lent is a good time to be part of 40 Days for Life in Patchogue through prayer and/or our presence with those praying by the abortion facility on Waverly Avenue. (See page 9)

I close with this passage from Isaiah 26:1-4, 7-9, 12:

A strong city have we;
he sets up walls and ramparts to protect us.
Open up the gates
to let in a nation that is just,
one that keeps faith.

A nation of firm purpose you keep in peace; in peace, for its trust in you.

Trust in the Lord forever!

For the Lord is an eternal Rock.

The way of the just is smooth;
the path of the just you make level.
Yes, for your way and your judgments, O Lord,
we look to you;
Your name and your title
are the desire of our souls.

My soul yearns for you in the night, yes, my spirit within me keeps vigil for you; When your judgment dawns upon the earth, the world's inhabitants learn justice.

O Lord, you mete out peace to us, for it is you who have accomplished all we have done.






