

LENT 2018

ABSTINENCE AND FASTING

All Catholics who have reached their fourteenth (14th) year are bound to abstain entirely from meat on all the Fridays of Lent. All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Good Friday fast and abstinence.



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Second Sunday of Lent

Pick Up the Phone

Dear Parish Family:

I don't know about you but I am not too much of a phone person. I speak to one priest friend every night, usually, but that's about it. If someone calls me I do my best to call them back in a timely manner (I try to do it in 24 hours but have come up short many times). Other than that, like many of you perhaps, I text, e-mail, and now sometimes send a picture on some social media app. It's a lot easier. I can be done with it in a few seconds and honestly, there's no risk of getting "stuck" on the phone.

A member of the Pastoral Team pointed out to me that I probably rely too much on e-mail and those ways of communication. "What would it take to pick up the phone? We have all these extensions now. Why not use them?" they countered. They're right. I'd rather keep moving than taking the time to talk to someone. It's so busy I have convinced myself I have no time. It's not true.

This Monday, February 26th, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops are "calling" on each one of us to pick up the phone and to flood the offices of local congressional leaders about doing something to support the "Dreamers" and comprehensive immigration reform. I'm sure, like you, I listen to the teachings of Pope Francis and the bishops when it comes to the formation of conscience. So when the Church tells me its teachings about abortion or marriage or euthanasia, I allow that to form my conscience and, I hope, those of others. So when the United States bishops, in line with the teaching of Pope Francis, call us to be advocates for immigrants and immigration reform, I had better listen up. (It's easier to read the web page or see the flyer and then move on.)

In listening to the teaching of the Church on comprehensive immigration reform, I am challenged to move past some of my own insecurities and judgments — and even biases — to embrace the teaching of the Gospel especially when it comes to the vulnerable. The approximately 1.8 million dreamers—those who were brought here as CHILDREN by their parents who were seeking, in most cases, a better life for their families— were protected temporarily by the DACA program which will end on March 5th without some congressional intervention and presidential leadership. The USCCB encourages us to call "to protect Dreamers from deportation, to provide them a path to citizenship, and to avoid any damage to existing protections for families and unaccompanied minors in the process." You can—and we all must— learn more at www.usccb.org.



Honestly, I can probably write a good e-mail or send off a good letter or even say a powerful prayer about this issue. Picking up the phone? That's a little more personal. I may be rejected. I might have to defend my opinion. I cannot just take my "shot" and hit send. I might have to have an interaction that can be uncomfortable. Yes. I may. But I must. How can I not stand up for the dignity of families? How can I not risk discomfort on behalf of those human beings in my midst who may be forced back to countries of poverty and violence? What kind of disciple of Jesus would I be if I didn't pick up the phone?

Is that enough? No way! Is it a start? You bet. Some of my best encounters of friendship, ministry, service and compassion started with a phone call. So this Monday—pick up the phone!

LITURGICAL PRACTICES, GOOD HEALTH AND COMMON SENSE!

My former Pastor, Msgr. Joseph DeGrocco, a former professor of liturgy at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, prepared a brief article for my former parish's bulletin that runs during the winter months. With his permission, I have reprinted it here. As we are in the midst of the winter season, there are some good things to consider in our celebration of the Eucharist.

As we come to celebrate Mass together each week during these winter days, it's a good time to review some common-sense liturgical practices and issues, to help everyone stay healthy and to care for one another.

- <u>Holy Communion:</u> Priests, deacons and extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion are especially encouraged to wash and sanitize their hands before Mass begins. If Communion ministers need to clean their hands during Mass, it must be done discreetly. The best way for extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion to clean their hands during Mass is to use a sanitizing liquid in the pew before coming into the sanctuary (sanitizing liquids have no place on the altar or among the Communion vessels and other sacred items on the credence table).
- Communion from the Chalice: The faithful should refrain from drinking from the chalice when one has a cold or is fearful of being infected.
- Receiving on the Tongue: Faithful who normally receive Holy Communion on the tongue should refrain from receiving on the tongue and instead receive in the hand when one has a cold or is otherwise contagious. Do not spread your saliva to the hand of the Communion minister if you are sick; receive Communion in the hand instead.
- <u>Greeting of Peace:</u> Use your own discretion and best judgment when invited to exchange the greeting of peace during the liturgy; limit physical contact with others if necessary. If a handshake is not advisable, a simple bow of the head is acceptable. Do not be insulted if someone prefers to avoid shaking your hand.
- Mass Attendance: MOST IMPORTANTLY, IF YOU ARE SICK, PLEASE DO NOT COME TO MASS! There is no obligation to attend Mass if you are sick; it is not a sin to miss Mass for this reason. (Also, there is no need to go to Confession if you miss Mass because you are sick.) Personal prayer and reflection on the Sunday Scripture readings is encouraged; many people also enjoy viewing the Mass on television.

REBUILD + REPAIR + RESTORE

Your people shall rebuild the ancient ruins; the foundations from ages past you shall raise up; "Repairer of the breach," they shall call you, "Restorer of ruined dwellings." -Isaiah 58:11-12

We are continuing to move forward in the restoration work of the church building. This past week, work began on the floor. As mentioned previously, the restored church building will have a polished concrete floor. You can see the work happening in the pictures to the left. Our "sheet rocking" continues as does the final parts of the installation of our sprinkler system. We still have a way to go but we're getting there!





Como católicos, creemos firmemente en la importancia y la necesidad del hermoso sacramento del Bautismo. Es realmente el fundamento de nuestra vida como cristianos. Debido a la gran importancia de este sacramento, nosotros como cristianos católicos estamos llamados a hacer todo lo que esté a nuestro alcance para asegurarnos de que a nuestros hijos no se les prive de los beneficios del Bautismo por más tiempo del que es absolutamente necesario. Hay una mentalidad entre algunos católicos de que el bautismo puede demorarse durante muchos meses o incluso años. Los motivos de esta línea de pensamiento son variados, pero todos pierden el punto fundamental de que un niño debe ser bautizado tan pronto como sea razonablemente posible. En realidad, retrasar el bautismo de un hijo durante meses o años puede ser una negligencia pecaminosa.

La Introducción al Rito del Bautismo de los Niños declara:

"En cuanto al momento del bautismo, la primera consideración es el bienestar del niño, que no puede ser privado del beneficio de el sacramento". "También dice:" Un bebé debe ser bautizado dentro de las primeras semanas después del Nacimiento."

Un cambio que debe notarse que es efectivo de inmediato en nuestra parroquia es que los niños que son traídos para el Bautismo que están por encima de la edad de la razón (7 años de edad), deberán inscribirse en el programa de dos años de educación religiosa siguiendo las pautas del Rito de iniciación cristiana (RCIA #256).
