# A Message from Father Felix...

#### If today you hear his voice, harden not your heart...

It is an iconic story, popular even among unbelievers and agnostics. It's been a favorite subject for artists across the centuries. It does not matter how many times we have read it; it never loses its power to move us. It is Jesus' famous parable of the prodigal son (Luke 15:11-32). This is why many scripture writers said that Jesus taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes (Mark 1:22). This Lent, we should take an in-depth look at this parable to see what Jesus wants to teach us, both about ourselves and about our heavenly Father. As we reflect on the actions of the two sons and the father in this story, it can lead us to examine our hearts. We should ask ourselves these two questions: Are there obstacles that are keeping us from fully experiencing the immensity of God's love and mercy? Are there attitudes or assumptions that need to change so that we can draw closer to the Lord?

The first reading for Ash Wednesday is always taken from the prophet Joel: "Return to me with your whole heart" (Joel 2:12). Lent is a season for returning to the Lord, so let's use this special time to reflect on Jesus' parable of the prodigal son and return to God our heavenly Father. The parable begins with a young man asking for his share of his father's inheritance (Luke 15:12). Take note, he was essentially acting as if his father was already dead. Here was a son who no longer wanted his father in his life; he only wanted his inheritance. The younger son did not appreciate what the father had provided to him. He became so restless in life.

He wanted a free life without the responsibilities and duties that were required of him in his father's house; he could do whatever he wanted, whenever he chose to do it. This young man was a son, with all the rights and responsibilities that come with a relationship. Rather, he chose not to follow the right way of life. He left his father and went to a distant country, where he lived an immoral life. It happened that he became a slave to his desires. We forget sometimes that there is no permanent condition in life. Little did he know about life. After his money was gone and famine struck, he "hired himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine" (Luke 15:15). He was almost literally a slave, someone who was so hungry that he longed to eat the pods that were fed to the pigs (Luke 15:16). We know that all of us are sons and daughters of God. Yet, there are times when we forget and act as if we were slaves. We see our Christian responsibilities as burdensome and do them out of duty, not love. We allow idols to take the place of God in our lives and, in effect, become slaves to those things.

**Coming to his senses**, the young man was in desperate straits. He had only one option, that was to return home to his father. He had cut himself off from his father. Jesus tells us that the young man even rehearsed the plea he would make when he returned. "Father, I have sinned against heaven and you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers" (Luke15:18-19). It took abject poverty and famine for this man to acknowledge his sin; he had offended both God and his father. He knew that his decision to leave home with his father's money to sustain an immoral lifestyle was a grievous mistake. It had hurt both him and his father as well.

Jesus told us this story so that we would understand that whatever wrong we have done, however far gone we feel, it is never too late to "come to our senses" and return to our heavenly Father. It is never too late to begin the journey back to our Father's house. There is no better time than this season of lent for us to repent and return to the Lord. Jesus" parable is reassuring. We may stray from God our Father at times, but the mark of baptism never leaves us a bit. We don't forfeit our relationship as sons and daughters of God even when we sin. He will always restore us to our rightful place in His family, as the father did in Jesus' parable, when we return to him with our whole hearts. One thing is certain that the younger son's repentance is real and that he now takes up his responsibilities in his father's house with gratitude and joy. We would also like to think that the older son lets go of his anger and comparison, and truly welcomes his brother back with an open heart. Above all, we would like to see their relationship with their father fully restored so that they can experience all the blessings and responsibilities of their sonship.

That is the ending that God envisions for all of us no matter how we have strayed from him. Each of us must decide for himself or herself how we can return to God our Father. "If today you hear his voice harden not your hearts." (Ps 95:8)

# Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jb 7:1-4, 6-7 | 1 Cor 9:16-19, 22-23 | Mk 1:29-39

#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Why me? It could be a flat tire, a lost job or a serious illness. When inconvenient, unpleasant or even downright horrible things happen, it is understandable to wonder why God allows it. I know that is what goes through my head in extreme adversity. God can do all things, so why wouldn't he change "this thing" for me? In the Gospel, we see Jesus curing Simon Peter's mother-inlaw of her illness, but many of us don't have our prayers answered like that. Instead, we may relate more to Job in today's first reading when he says life is a "drudgery" and he "shall not see happiness again." The reality is that God's ways are not our ways, so we can't know why some people endure hardship while others receive miracles. But we can change how we respond to those hardships when they arrive. Just as this passage from Job is understood better within the context of the whole book, discrete events in our lives are part of something larger than ourselves. Praying with Scripture, including reading more of Job, can help us understand how God is molding, refining, and yes – always loving us.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When we are tempted to feel like Job is a good time to embrace the ageold practice of "offering it [suffering] up." As a child, my parents explained that offering it up meant I was telling God I would happily suffer in exchange for it helping someone else. What does this really mean? Everything stems from our being united to Christ in our baptism and being participants in his priestly, prophetic and royal office. We offer ourselves, our whole being, including our worship, praise, joy, gratitude, bodies and even sufferings to God as sacrifice. So, to "offer it [suffering] up" is a powerful way of taking a bad situation and allowing it to be used for something good; to give our inconvenience, pain and grief to the Lord and ask him to unite it to Christ's suffering for the good of others. It is a redemptive act, a form of love-in-action. St. Paul is a great example of someone who suffered gladly, and in today's second reading he shares that "to the weak [he] became weak, to win over the weak."

**PRAY** Offering up our sufferings and difficulties is a way to participate in the redemptive work of Christ. It is a simple way to pray and can keep our focus on God throughout the day. There isn't any one specific prayer for doing this. Instead, when something unpleasant or painful happens, take a moment to acknowledge it and give it to the Lord. It can be as simple as saying, "Lord, I am happy to endure this for the benefit of others." You may want to insert a specific intention or offer it for the souls in purgatory. It's not always easy – especially when your suffering is great – but give it a try this week.

**FEBRUARY 14th** 

All Catholics between the ages of eighteen (18) and fifty-nine (59) inclusive are also bound to observe the law of fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means limiting oneself to a single full meal and avoiding food between meals. Two other light meals, which together do not equal a full meal, may be taken during the day. Those whose work or health would be impaired are excused from fast and abstinence. Individual conscience should decide proper cause for excuse. A more serious reason is required to excuse oneself from the Ash Wednesday and Good Friday fast and abstinence.

# A Message from Msgr. Walden...

Recently I started reading a book by Senator Ted Cruz from Texas, "Unwoke, How to Defeat Cultural Marxism in America". His family came from Cuba and escaped from the government Fidel Castro set up when he came to power. One of the people working with Castro was Che Guevara, a noted revolutionary. Cruz writes, "In the late 1950s, when Fidel Castro and his fellow revolutionaries were still hiding in the mountains Guevara often murdered people suspected of being loyal to the revolution. He did so without giving these men a trial or allowing them to speak in their own defense. He would simply make the man in question kneel, say a few words, and then fire single shot into the back of his head." How gruesome, unjust, and inhumane. Of course Guevara was preceded by countless people in history who murdered their fellow citizens: Hitler, Stalin, and Mao were much more lethal. How can a society survive when murder is used to bring about what the leaders want and promote?

A terrible parallel to this jumped out to me when I read this headline in the Wall Street Journal a number of days ago: Biden Backs Abortion Rights In First 2024 Campaign. As leader of our nation he is promoting the killing of children in the womb so people will vote for him. How can we be so blind to history repeating itself when it is right in front of us. Guevara, Hitler, Mao, and Stalin are dead, but the havoc, suffering, and chaos they unleashed and promoted caused unbelievable suffering death to countless innocent people.

Let say clearly I am not seeking to tell anyone how to vote or who to vote for. My thoughts are not to condemn politicians or a political party. My concern is the moral issue of what responsibility we take on when we support candidates with the platform of abortion. People in our nation get elected because we have the power, right, and responsibility to vote for them. When a candidate openly supports, promotes, and seeks to codify abortion into law where does of support of that candidate leave those who vote for him or her? Two very clear Scripture passages come to mind:

Matthew 18:6-7: "Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea. Woe to the world because of things that cause sin! Such things must come, but woe to the one through whom they come!" Ezekiel 3:17:21: "Son of man, I have appointed you a sentinel for the house of Israel. When you hear a word from my mouth, you shall warn them for me. If I say to the wicked, You shall surely die—and you do not warn them or speak out to dissuade the wicked from their evil conduct in order to save their lives—then they shall die for their sin, but I will hold you responsible for their blood. If, however, you warn the wicked and they still do not turn from their



wickedness and evil conduct, they shall die for their sin, but you shall save your life. But if the just turn away from their right conduct and do evil when I place a stumbling block before them, then they shall die. Since you did not warn them about their sin, they shall still die, and the just deeds that they performed will not be remembered on their behalf. I will, however, hold you responsible for their blood. If, on the other hand, you warn the just to avoid sin, and they do not sin, they will surely live because of the warning, and you in turn shall save your own life."

The gift of life comes with responsibility to use the freedom we have to do good and avoid evil. Jesus faced evil head on, suffered for it, and rose above and beyond it. But He died with a clear conscience. Following Jesus in the Catholic Church is a true gift to be shared for our own good and the good of all people. Peace of mind comes only when we seek, know, and live the truth of who we are as Catholics in the world today. There will be opposition, ridicule, and derogatory remarks and accusations.

Jesus spoke these challenging and encouraging words to us at the Last Supper (John 15:18:27): "If the world hates you, realize that it hated me first. If you belonged to the world, the world would love its own; but because you do not belong to the world, and I have chosen you out of the world, the world hates you. Remember the word I spoke to you, 'No slave is greater than his master. If they persecuted me, they will also persecute you. If they kept my word, they will also keep yours. And they will do all these things to you on account of my name, because they do not know the one who sent me. If I had not come and spoken to them, they would have no sin; but as it is they have no excuse for their sin. Whoever hates me also hates my Father. If I had not done works among them that no one else ever did, they would not have sin; but as it is, they have seen and hated both me and my Father. But in order that the word written in their law might be fulfilled, 'They hated me without cause.' "When the Advocate comes whom I will send you from the Father, the Spirit of truth that proceeds from the Father, he will testify to me. And you also testify, because you have been with me from the beginning."

# Women's Group...

Fr. Timothy Gallagher's book on The Discernment of Spirits, lists St. Ignatius' 14 rules for discernment, then goes through each rule a chapter at a time, describing how to apply it in our lives. In the ups & downs, consolations and desolations of our spiritual life, we go through



times of pure joy to "Where are You Jesus?"

St. Ignatius (1491-1556), recuperating from war wounds was given reading material on the life of Christ & the saints. As he thought about what he read, he became aware of his thought patterns, how the thoughts affected his feelings, and how the good feelings remained with him. When he had worldly thoughts, although he felt good while thinking them, he noticed that afterward the feelings left him empty. He continued reading spiritual books, growing in wisdom. God was leading him, fulfilling His Plan for him to be a great saint & to teach us. God's plan for us is the same, the process is slow.

As women who love Jesus, we need & want to learn to recognize Jesus' voice & grow closer to Him. At times we feel inadequate, wondering is this Jesus speaking, me or the enemy? In our group we begin to see we're all equal, with the problems, emotions, weaknesses, same confusion, strengths, desires, fears, doing the best we can, we don't have to be perfect. Jesus consoles us through our love for each other. If you feel desire to come but are fearful, we understand because we've been there & at times still are, so just come as you are, no rules or requirements, you don't have to read or share. We privacy of others, respect the sharing is anonymous!
