As per the directives of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, the Sacrament of Reconciliation is not to be celebrated in <u>any scheduled or communal way</u> out of concern for your health and safety. Those in need of the sacrament should contact the Parish Office. The priest on duty will set a time to meet you in the church building to hear your confession (face to face or behind the screen). There are not and will not be any scheduled times for confessions in the near future.

PRAYING FOR ONE ANOTHER IN THESE DAYS

Each day we ring the church bells at certain hours. They are a call to prayer for different groups of people impacted by the pandemic. Whether you can hear the bells or not, please consider taking a minute to stop and pray each day.

9 a.m. - Prayer for those infected with the virus and all who are ill

Lord, place your healing hand on those who suffer illness. Bring them to full health and ease their anxious hearts. May our prayer and the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary encourage them that they are not alone. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN

12 p.m. - Prayer for health care workers and those attending to the sick

Lord, we are ennobled by those who put their lives at risk in caring for the sick. Keep them safe and embolden them when they are weary. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN

3 p.m. - Prayer for first responders and essential workers

Lord, we pray for those who run to danger to keep us safe and those who serve the common good. Embrace them with your mantle of protection and comfort the fears of their families. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN

<u>6 p.m.</u> - Prayer for people of every nation and their leaders

Lord, the pandemic opens our eyes to see each other as brothers and sisters in one human family. We pray for people of every nation and their leaders, asking that they be inspired to seek the good of all and quell the voices of division. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN

9 p.m. - Prayer for those who have died today

Lord, we grieve the passing of our sisters and brothers who have died this day. We commend them to your tender mercy, confident that nothing, not even death, will separate us from your love. We ask this in Jesus' Name. AMEN.

THE LITURGY OF THE HOURS



The Liturgy of the Hours, also known as the Divine Office or the Work of God (*Opus Dei*), is the daily prayer of the Church, marking the hours of each day and sanctifying the day with prayer. The Hours are a meditative dialogue on the mystery of Christ, using scripture and prayer. At times the dialogue is between the Church or individual soul and God; at times it is a dialogue among the members of the Church; and at times it is even between the Church and the world...The dialogue is always held, however, in the presence of God and using the words and wisdom of God. Each of the five canonical Hours includes selections from the Psalms that culminate in a scriptural proclamation. The two most important or hinge Hours are Morning and Evening Prayer. These each include a Gospel canticle: the Canticle of Zechariah from Luke 1:68-79

for Morning Prayer (known as the *Benedictus*), and the Canticle of Mary from Luke 1:46-55 for Evening Prayer (known as the *Magnificat*). The Gospel canticle acts as a kind of meditative extension of the scriptural proclamation in light of the Christ event. Morning and Evening Prayer also include intercessions that flow from the scriptural proclamation just as the Psalms prepare for it.

In the Hours, the royal priesthood of the baptized is exercised, and this sacrifice of praise is thus connected to the sacrifice of the Eucharist, both preparing for and flowing from the Mass.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"Many were amazed..."

WHY NOT ALL?

Dear Parish Family:

I remember praying at a funeral a number of years ago for a friend from elementary school. We graduated from Our Lady of Lourdes School in West Islip in 1989. We were not particularly close after graduation. I remembered his family and was able to participate.

I remember the presider reflecting on this Sunday's gospel—Luke 11:1-41. Families often choose at least part of the this particular chapter of John's Gospel for a loved one's funeral. There's a lot to preach about, no? Martha. Mary. Jesus' proclamation that he is the resurrection and the life. The raising of Lazarus. The burial bands.

The preacher, rather, preached about one word that was not even in the gospel. He asked, "Why weren't <u>all</u> amazed?" The gospel states that "Now many of the Jews who had come to Mary and seen what he had done began to believe in him." How could they all not be amazed? A man they all knew had died was raised to life. They witnessed this. Scriptural and cultural scholars probably have valid reasons for this lack of total belief. I left the church building that day a little shaken up.

Where would I be? Would I be part of the many? Would I be part of the others who are not part of the many? Would I nit pick about if it really happened? Would I complain because it didn't happen the way I thought it should? Would I resist because I wasn't as big a part of it as I may have wanted?

I think of some of these days we are going through. I think most days I am part of the many. I know God is in the midst of all of this, somewhere. I know God is going to use this darkness to bring us a brighter light. I can preach it. I can talk with people about it. I believe it.

Then there are days and times when I am not part of the many. I find myself overwhelmed by the details of parish and school. I am overwhelmed by being "distanced" from family and friends living out here. I struggle to figure out how we are going to come through all of this financially, spiritually, and structurally as a parish and a regional school. I lose my place among the many.

Then, I try to step back and take a look. There are many reasons for me to remember I need to keep pushing myself to the many. I think of the privilege of praying with so many each morning at Mass even if it is not the way I want it to be. I consider the opportunity to meet and pray with all of the students in OLQA during our Morning Prayer even though I would prefer to be with them in person. I reflect on the many interactions I have each day now via Google hangout and Zoom and the phone even if I would prefer to speak face to face. I think of the ways we are trying to be part of caring for the poor and vulnerable from a distance even though I want to reach out and welcome everyone here. The list can go on. I bet yours can go on too!

There are reasons to be part of the many, especially in these days! We can still pray. We can still connect. We can still love. We can still serve. Maybe we're beginning to realize we don't need as much as we think to do these things. The things we really need in this life are not limited by distance, by celebration, by location, by building, by pandemic. I hope God continues to focus me on what we do have in spite of all of this! Indeed there are many good reasons to be part of the "many". Who knows maybe one day it will be all!

Another Act of Spiritual Communion

This Act of Spiritual Communion is given to us by our Holy Father, Pope Francis: I prostrate myself at your feet, O my Jesus, and I offer you the repentance of my contrite heart, which abases itself in its nothingness and in Your holy Presence. I adore You in the Sacrament of your Love, the ineffable Eucharist. I desire to receive You in my poor abode that my heart offers You. While waiting for the happiness of a Sacramental Communion, I want to possess You in spirit. Come to me, O my Jesus, that I may come to You. May your Love be able to inflame my whole being, in life and in death. I believe in You, I hope in You, I love You. Amen.

The Angelus

The Angelus is a traditional prayer by which we can connect and reconnect with our ever-present God throughout the day. The Angelus is a brief reflection on the incarnation, recalling Mary's yes to God's invitation to bring Christ into the world. Prayed at 6:00 a.m., noon (often accompanied by a prayer for peace), and 6:00 p.m., the Angelus is a pause in the rhythm of our days in which we can recall Emmanuel, God with us. You can view a version of it on our You Tube channel

ALL: In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. AMEN.

Leader: The Angel of the Lord declared to Mary:

ALL: And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. ALL: Hail Mary...

Leader: Behold the handmaid of the Lord:

ALL: Be it done unto me according to Thy word.

ALL: Hail Mary . . .

Leader: And the Word was made Flesh:

ALL: And dwelt among us.

ALL Hail Mary . . .

Leader: Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God,

ALL: that we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Leader: Let us pray: ALL: Pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the incarnation of Christ, Thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection, through the same Christ Our Lord. Amen.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. AMEN


Chaplet of the Divine Mercy

In her years in the convent, St. Faustina heard a call from God to make God's mercy known to the world so that the world may more fully receive God's healing grace. St. Faustina promoted the Chaplet of Divine Mercy which consists of the recitation of prayers to the Eternal

Father with the use of the rosary for the sake of Christ's sorrowful passion. The Chaplet is traditionally prayed at 3 p.m. each day, marking the hour of Jesus' death on the cross.

The Chaplet is prayed as follows:

- 1. Begin with the Sign of the Cross, one Our Father, one Hail Mary, and the Apostles' Creed.
- 2. On the Our Father beads, recite the following: "Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your dearly beloved Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world."
- 3. On the ten Hail Mary beads, say the following: "For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world."
- 4. Repeat step two and three for all five decades.
- 5. Conclude by reciting three times:
- "Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world."

Teachers at OLQA now have virtual classrooms where attendance is required every day. Through conferencing, outside resources, assignments, assessments and the like, students are continuing the tradition of academic excellence.

Students gather each morning and afternoon for announcements, and most importantly, prayer. Each morning we try to have a special guest come to the Morning Prayer to share with us their experiences and to lead us in prayer. Guests have included Dr. Kathleen Walsh, Superintendent of

Schools, Carolyn Lapham from SJE, Kim Sureau, a nurse practitioner at NYU (and Fr. John's sister who made him give everyone a 1/2 day!), Fr. Michael, Mrs. Austin, and Seminarian Joe Catafago.

In addition to providing for the academic needs of our young people, our social work staff provides Google Hangouts to make sure students are doing the best they can. We have had "Saturday School", a voluntary check in so young people know they are not alone even on the weekends and Night Prayer.

Lenten backpacks may be left at the Main Entrance doors of the Church.



Discussion Questions

- 3. Jesus endured the sense of being abandoned by the one he loved most, his Abba. He chose to experience all of humanity's worst suffering. What does this tell us? Even though he couldn't access their love, do you think the Father and the Spirit were there with Jesus on the cross?
