A Message from Angela Werner...

A Reflection on the Gospel: Luke (15:1-3, 11-32)

"Now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."

In The Parable of the Prodigal Son, the father already knew that his son's decision was an unwise one. Still, he allowed him to make that choice. If any parent were to give his or her child a gift that was fragile and delicate, it is likely that the parent would have some reservations about whether that child would be careful enough with it, so that it wouldn't fall, and break into pieces. Still, the gift is given, because the parent loves the child. Most people would agree that one of the most difficult challenges for parents is allowing their children to make their own mistakes, which can be a heartbreaking endeavor. Jesus compares the father in this parable to God the Father, who allows His children (all of us) to make our own choices. There are

consequences that go along with those choices, however.

Here, we are given a taste of the reality that if we were to have everything in this world except God, we would have nothing, and that if we were to have nothing but God, we would have everything. God gave us a perfect, yet breakable world, and we are the ones who broke it. Similarly, we are the ones who break our relationship with God when we sin. Still, God wants us to come to Him with all of our broken pieces, so that He can put them back together for us. He never stops loving us, just like a parent never stops loving his or her child, no matter what. Not only does God give us the gift of life, but He loves us so much that He gives each of us the gift of a free will. This is something He will never take away from any one of us, because our free will is what allows us to choose Him, or not.

In this gospel, Jesus highlights the complexity of parental love. We can only guide our children, we can't live their lives for them. If we find this difficult as earthly parents, what must it be like for our Heavenly Father? When anything good or bad happens to a child, it affects the parent as well. Love creates that connection. The love that connected the father to the older son is the same love that connected the father to the younger son. This parable teaches us that God's love for us is unconditional. It would be impossible for Him to love any one of us more than the other, and His forgiveness is available to all of us.

The older son found himself being resentful, saying to his father, "Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders...yet for him you slaughter the fattened calf." The father tried to make him understand by saying, "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours."

Sometimes, we can get so caught up in unnecessary worries, that we fail to see the blessings that are right in front of us, like the older son in the parable. We can easily forget how important it is to cherish all the special people and moments we are given. Martha's sister, Mary, gives us a beautiful example of this, for she knew how to cherish that important moment when Jesus was in their midst. Love is found in the relationship. God will always love us, but He also wants a genuine relationship with each of us, one filled with trust, friendship, and respect. It is why He created us. But when sin gets in the way of that relationship, there is a

need for repentance in order for the relationship to be restored. Repentance is knitted into the fabric of relationships which causes us to long for unity, just as the younger son longed to be reunited with his father. It is how we are patterned by God, who created us in His image and likeness. We are designed for



love. Grown children often wonder why time seems to disappear when they visit their parents. Perhaps it's because it reminds them of that part of their lives when schedules weren't important, and worry didn't exist. No one wants the visit to end because it is a little piece of Heaven, and a foretaste of the timeless reality we will enter as we pass from this life into eternity, when we will enjoy the infinite experience of God's unconditional love.

> This brings us to the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The Parable of the Prodigal Son becomes the blueprint for this sacrament: "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you." God wants us (like the prodigal son) to 'come to our senses' when we realize we have sinned. No matter what goes wrong in our lives, or where we might find ourselves, turning to God in the midst of it is always the right thing to do. God the Father wants us to be honest with Him about out failings (as the prodigal son was), trusting in His love. This is

why a good honest Confession is so important in our relationship with God. And when we receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation often, it keeps those lines of communication with God open, and flowing with graces. Sin takes us away from God's light, but never His love. God waits for everyone with hopeful anticipation, even the latecomers with dirt on their feet. Reconciliation is important in human relationships as well. Often, the relationship becomes stronger after the reconciliation than it was before the break.

God wants to embrace us in the same way the father in the parable embraced his repentant son. We are dead in our sin, but when we receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we come back to life, as the father in the parable says, "This son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found." The Sacrament of Reconciliation allows God the Father to 'bring the finest robe and put it on us,' and to 'put a ring on our finger, and sandals on our feet' so we can dust ourselves off, and get back on the right path...the path toward Heaven. The joy God offers through a reconciliation with Him doesn't come with words to describe it.

Reconciliation with God is a reason to celebrate and rejoice! What could be more sublime than knowing that you have been brought back into a 'right relationship' with God, 'back safe and sound,' as the prodigal son was? Is this not the entire meaning of life? A friendship with God is what gives our life significance, because this life is a springboard to eternity. Being reconciled with God is something we should never put off until tomorrow, for tomorrow is promised to no one. God knows we will make mistakes. But when we do, He wants us to run back to Him, because He will always be there, ready with open arms! The unconditional love of the father in this parable is merely a glimpse of the unconditional love of God. To be on the receiving end of that kind of love can only be described as heavenly. And Heaven is where the celebration truly begins.





Father Jerry Kaywell is the pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Punta Gorda, Florida, known for his engaging and dynamic approach to delivering sermons. He combines eloquence, inspiration and humor in his preaching. Music has been a defining part of his life, with Father Jerry composing music from a young age and working in film and television as a composer and producer. He co-created award-winning digital commercials and contributed to a Grammy-winning gospel album.

Under his leadership, the church was rebuilt and opened in 2008. He continues to serve his parish with joy. Father Jerry is delighted to be giving the parish mission here at St. John the Evangelist this year.

A Message from Msgr. Walden...

As we continue our journey through Lent, this Sunday offers us a familiar Gospel reading (Luke 15:1-3, 11-32) which was painted around 1668 by the Dutch painter Rembrandt as he was coming to the end of his life. This painting inspired the spiritual writer Henri Nouwen to go to St. Petersburg in Russia and sit before it a number of days and then to write a book entitled "The Return of the Prodigal Son" in 1992. The painting is actually life size or bigger, and as Nouwen shares his reflection, he challenges us to look at each of the main characters in the painting and see ourselves in the prodigal son, the elder brother, and the father.

In our weaker moments, we have all had the experience of being the prodigal son. We have those moments when we are selfish, ungrateful, unfaithful, wasteful, mean, spiteful, unforgiving and take others for granted. The prodigal son finally decided to return when all other options had been exhausted. But in his decision he recognized how undeserving he was to resume his place as the a son of his father and humbly knelt before him and asked to be a hired servant. Rembrandt painted him kneeling before his father - ragged, dirty, and disheveled, and his father embracing and comforting him with his hands. This passage from St. Luke tells us, "While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him. His son said to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son." From a merely human point of view, how true. "But his father ordered his servants, 'Quickly bring the finest robe, and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found." It is not that the father found his son, but that he rejoiced to embrace him once again. How hard to totally banish and exile our own flesh and blood no matter how sinful, ungrateful, and troubling we are tempted to feel about them.

We are also challenged in this passage to rise above the jealousy and cold-heartedness of the elder son. How often we long to see others get their due for hurting us or at least seeing them grovel in shame. But most of all, we are challenged to believe that God loves us exactly as we



are at this very moment in our lives. Yes, we have memories of things we should never have done or said. We feel ashamed and lost because we cannot go back and erase the evil we have done. But to find peace, we must believe that we are loved for who we are, not what we have done. people can be proud of what we have done and achieved, our true security and joy comes from being loved simply for the person we are in the depths of our minds and hearts where true goodness, love, and joy reside. The joy of the forgiving father gave life where life was lost. His hope for his elder son's jealous, vengeful words were so simple and expressed with these paternal, God-like words: "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother and has come to dead life again; he was lost and has been found."

Everything we have that is good, starting with life itself, is a pure gift from God. How good it is when we seek to get beyond being self-centered and jealous, seeking forgiveness and becoming the life-giving source of love and forgiveness God is to us. May we live the words we so sorely need to hear when we go to the Sacrament of Penance. Reconciliation with God urges us to be reconciled with one another. I invite you to come and hear these sorely needed words of love and reconciliation in our personal lives and in our world. How blessed we are to have the opportunity to go to confession after each week day mass, on Saturday from 4:00-5:00 PM, and Sunday from 5:30-6:00 PM right here in our parish church.





Are you a baptized, practicing adult Catholic who has received the Sacrament of Holy Communion but not the Sacrament of Confirmation?

For those who were never confirmed as a child, there is a way to receive this holy sacrament as an adult. The Sacrament of Confirmation is a strengthening in the indwelling, action and grace of the Holy Spirit. Without it, one is not fully initiated into the Catholic Church, because this Sacrament confirms your baptism and empowers you to live a genuine life of witness as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

Preparation is needed to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation, which is given to adult Catholics once a year on the Solemn Feast of Pentecost (Sunday, June 8, 2025). The process to be confirmed as an adult requires a mature grasp of the Catholic faith and freely committing oneself to live it. Informal classes on the Catholic Faith are given to adult candidates for Confirmation over the seven weeks leading up to Pentecost (April 23 – Jun 4, 2025).
