LOCKDOWNS AND LIFE

Dear Parish Family:

The bulletin is due to the printer by Wednesday at 12 Noon. We tend to get it there by 12 midnight. Thank goodness for their patience. For some reason, we seemed to be a day ahead this week...so I started this letter on Tuesday morning. I was thinking of the Scripture passage on the front cover of the bulletin and how Jesus would not leave us orphans. The Spirit will come! There is new life always.

Then I started to go through the pages of this bulletin to edit and finalize (yes, we still need a bulletin editor!) and saw all the signs of life that this community of faith enters into...

- Incredible outreach that provides support from beginning to end
- Young people caring for the developmentally disabled
- Words from the bishops of New York states about caring for moms and doing all we can to eliminate
- The Mission learning about addiction and recovery and service and healing
- Opportunities for children and young people to know great learning environments in the school and in the summer at Bible Camp.

Then, after returning from IGHL on Tuesday afternoon (see page 5), I looked up at a news update about another school shooting, this time in Uvalde, Texas. I just shook my head.

One of the things that has brought the greatest amount of anxiety for me in my years as the pastor, principal, and teacher in the school is the lockdown drills. I remember working to write the safety plan in 2018 and 2019 and working to implement new practices and procedures. After every lock down drill I would usually need to take 20 minutes or so to exhale. We had a lockdown drill last Thursday when I was teaching. We moved into a corner of the room. We did well but the same feelings and questions emerged. "What if....?...."How has it come to this...?" and more. I needed a few minutes.

When I say we did well with the drill, I mean the class I was teaching was silent and still, followed all the protocols, and didn't flinch even when the door handle was shaken and someone tried to knock. We didn't move. Lockdown successful.

When we consider some of the issues related to school shootings and gun violence—yes, a life issue! have we become locked down? Are we so "in our corners" that there is no room for anyone to take a step? We see movements around other moral issues. Studies show that more and more people are opposed to the abortion and are grateful for the Church's renewed outreach. Other polls show that people are agreeing with the Church's teaching that the death penalty is abhorrent. There's been some movement, some openness to see there may be a better way.

I talked to one of my classes about the school shooting this morning. We read the words of Pope Francis about the shooting in Texas and read the statement of the Archbishop of San Antonio. When I asked students to share their initial reaction one young man raised his hand and said, "Fr. John this just happened last week. I feel like it's happening all the time now." Statistically that may or not be true. However, two things can happen when this feeling emerges. One is that we become so used to these events that we don't even respond to them anymore. A "What are you going to do?" mentality forms. Or, hopefully, they can inspire in us the courage to take a step out and be free to do all we can to support human life. I fear we have moved into the former but am praying for the latter.

That's Pentecost, no? The apostles were locked down for nine days in the upper room until the Spirit came to shake them up and out...and out they go to preach courageously, speak confidently, heal miraculously, and risk heroically.

Might the same be true for you and me when it comes to our call to build up a culture of life! Come Holy Spirit! Feetherson








Caring for the Homeless





Toward a Pro-Life Future in the Empire State

A statement by the Catholic Bishops of New York State

Humanity's salvation history was forever changed when a poor, devout Jewish girl from Galilee affirmatively said yes to life and set in motion the birth, ministry, sacrificial death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Mary's fiat ("Thy will be done.") was a gift of love to humanity, given freely in spite of her inability to know all that would entail, but with more faith in the Lord than fear of the unknown. In this month of Mary, we have an opportunity to reflect on her example, even as Americans grapple with gathering societal unrest over the issue of abortion.

"Any woman – regardless of age, religious belief or affiliation, marital status or immigration status – who is pregnant and in need, can come to the Catholic Church and we will give you the services and supports you need to carry your baby to term, regardless of your ability to pay."

Since the 1973 U.S. Supreme Court decision in Roe v. Wade effectively opened the door to abortion on demand throughout the land, an estimated 63 million unborn babies across the country have been killed in the womb before they could even draw their first breath of air. As we await a decision on Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, the recently argued Supreme Court case that could potentially overturn Roe, we pray for a positive outcome even as we acknowledge that abortion in New York would continue unfettered, and even be actively promoted as a social good by many elected officials. Sadly, New York, which legalized abortion three years before the Roe decision, has long been the abortion capital of the country, a tragic and sobering distinction.

Through the years, advocates for legal abortion have skillfully framed the narrative as one of "choice," and "reproductive freedom," completely ignoring the biological reality of what abortion is: the intentional killing of an innocent child in the womb. Even as sonogram technology and advances in neonatal medicine clearly show us the truth that what is being "terminated" is a human life, the pro-abortion movement refuses to address the science. The

abortion industry has been so successful in its messaging that the right to abortion has become inextricably linked to the notion of women's rights and equality for a significant portion of the country, which is why the prospect of a nation without Roe has led to fear and anxiety for many people.

Millions of our fellow Americans – even, it must be said, many of our fellow Catholics – have succumbed to this false notion, and we must respond to it in charity and with sensitivity, but with clarity. The fears and anxieties of a young woman faced with an unplanned pregnancy are valid. She is likely terrified. She may be overwhelmed with a plethora of legitimate questions: How will she provide for her other children with another baby on the way? Will the father abandon her? Will she be able to continue her education? Where will she and her family live? Who will provide childcare when she goes back to work? For many, abortion seems the only way out.

These feelings are real, and the challenges of an unplanned pregnancy are difficult. This presents a pastoral challenge for bishops, clergy, Church leaders and, indeed, for all faithful Catholics. Often, the Catholic Church is unjustly accused of being more concerned with the baby in the womb than with the mother and child once the infant has been born. As false as this notion is, it is incumbent upon us as shepherds to acknowledge and address that misperception.

As far back as the 1980s, the late John Cardinal O'Connor, a giant of the pro-life movement, made a pledge that we reaffirm today: Any woman – regardless of age, religious belief or affiliation, marital status or immigration status – who is pregnant and in need, can come to the Catholic Church and we will give you the services and supports you need to carry your baby to term, regardless of your ability to pay. Furthermore, we will not abandon you and your baby after delivery, but, rather, we will see to it that you have the resources that you and your child both need and deserve. No one will be turned away from life-affirming care. If you have had an abortion that you regret, whether recently or in the distant past, please come to us as well, so that we may offer you services to help you to heal.

We ask every Catholic parish, every Catholic Charities program, every Catholic health facility, every Catholic school, every Catholic college and university, and every religious community in our state to proactively engage with us in this pastoral effort. Together, through the New York

State Catholic Conference, we have gathered a list of many of the available resources at www.nyscatholic.org/HelpForMoms. You can also find a map to all Catholic parishes, schools and Catholic Charities agencies in the state at www.nyscatholic.org/places.

But our state and local governments must do their part as well. Elected officials constantly fall over themselves in rushing to announce new initiatives to ever expand abortion in order to garner votes. New York has long been one of the few states to require taxpayers to fund abortion through Medicaid. Planned Parenthood and other abortion providers have access to endless state funding streams. Perhaps the most egregious piece of abortion expansion legislation anywhere was the 2019 Reproductive Health Act. Championed by our previous governor, this act legalizes abortion on demand through nine months of pregnancy, declares abortion to be a fundamental right, allows non-physicians to perform abortions, and even removes criminal penalties for forced or coerced abortions. This year, our current governor codified a provision in the state budget requiring all health insurance plans to cover abortion, with virtually no exemptions for religious employers. Most recently, significant taxpayer funds were redirected to increase abortions in New York State.





Meanwhile, programs to support women who make the choice to keep their babies, to the extent that they exist at all, are starved for funding and are not well promoted. Yet many political leaders typically cater more to abortion providers and advocates than to women who might well make a different choice, if only they were aware of and had other options.

We understand full well that no Supreme Court decision will reduce the availability of abortion in New York. With that reality as a backdrop, state government has nothing to lose and everything to gain by working toward reducing the rate of abortion. There is common ground to be found, even in a state like New York. The recent state budget provision dramatically expanding postpartum Medicaid eligibility is proof of this. But why not work together to do more?

Declaración de los Obispos Católicos del Estado de Nueva York

La historia de salvación de la humanidad cambió para siempre cuando una pobre y devota muchacha judía de Galilea dijo sí a la vida y puso en marcha el nacimiento, el ministerio, la muerte sacrificial y la resurrección de nuestro Señor y Salvador, Jesucristo. El fiat de María ("Hágase tu voluntad") fue un don de amor a la humanidad, entregado libremente, a pesar de la incapacidad de María para conocer todo lo que implicaría, pero con más fe en el Señor que con temor a lo desconocido. En este mes de María, tenemos la oportunidad de reflexionar sobre su ejemplo, incluso en un momento en que los estadounidenses están afrontando una creciente agitación social por el tema del aborto.

A partir de que la decisión tomada por la Corte Suprema de los Estados Unidos en 1973, en la causa Roe v. Wade, abriera efectivamente la puerta al aborto a demanda en toda la nación. aproximadamente sesenta y tres millones de bebés no nacidos han sido asesinados en el vientre de su madre, en este país, antes de que pudieran siquiera respirar por primera vez. Mientras esperamos una decisión judicial en Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization, la causa recientemente tratada en la Corte Suprema que podría anular el fallo Roe, rezamos por un resultado positivo aun cuando reconocemos que el aborto en Nueva York continuaría sin restricciones, y que incluso sería activamente promovido como un bien social por muchos funcionarios elegidos por voto popular. Lamentablemente, Nueva York, donde se legalizó el aborto tres años antes del fallo Roe, ha sido desde hace mucho tiempo la capital nacional del aborto, una distinción trágica y realista.

A lo largo de los años, los defensores de la legalización del aborto han sido muy hábiles en su narrativa, enmarcando el aborto como una cuestión de "elección" reproductiva", y han ignorado por completo la realidad biológica de lo que es realmente es: el asesinato intencional de un niño inocente en el vientre de su madre. A pesar de que la tecnología de ultrasonido y los avances en medicina neonatal muestran claramente que con lo que se "termina" es con una vida humana, el movimiento pro aborto legal le da la espalda a la ciencia. La industria del aborto ha sido tan exitosa en su mensaje que el derecho al aborto se ha vuelto una cuestión completamente ligada

al concepto de igualdad y derechos de la mujer para gran parte del país, razón por la cual la perspectiva de una nación sin Roe ha provocado temor y ansiedad en muchas personas.

Millones de nuestros conciudadanos estadounidenses -e incluso, hay que decirlo, muchos de nuestros hermanos católicos- han sucumbido ante este falso concepto, y nosotros debemos responder con caridad y sensibilidad, pero de manera clara. Los temores y las ansiedades de una joven que se enfrenta a un embarazo no planificado son válidos. Es probable que se encuentre aterrorizada. Es posible que se sienta abrumada por una plétora de preguntas legítimas: ¿Cómo hará con un bebé en camino para mantener a sus otros hijos? ¿La abandonará el padre? ¿Podrá seguir estudiando? ¿Dónde vivirán ella y su familia? ¿Quién se encargará del cuidado de su hijo cuando ella vuelva a trabajar? Para muchos, el aborto parece ser la única salida.

Estos sentimientos son reales, y los desafíos de un embarazo no planificado son difíciles. Esto presenta un desafío para los obispos, los sacerdotes, los líderes de la Iglesia y, por cierto, para todos los fieles católicos. A menudo se acusa injustamente a la Iglesia Católica de preocuparse más por el bebé en el vientre materno que por la madre y el niño después del nacimiento. Por muy falso que sea este concepto, nos corresponde a nosotros, como pastores, reconocer y abordar esa percepción errónea.

En los años 80, el difunto Cardenal John O'Connor, un gigante del movimiento provida, hizo una promesa que hoy reafirmamos: "Toda mujer-independientemente de su edad, creencia o afiliación religiosa, estado civil o situación de inmigración– que esté embarazada y lo necesite puede acudir a la Iglesia Católica y nosotros le daremos los servicios y respaldos necesarios para llevar a término su embarazo, sin importar su solvencia o recursos". Más aun, después del parto, no te abandonaremos, ni a ti ni a tu bebé, sino que, por el contrario, nos encargaremos de que cuentes con los recursos que tú y tu hijo necesitan y merecen. A nadie se le negarán cuidados basados en la afirmación de la vida. Si has tenido un aborto del que te arrepientes, ya sea reciente o en un pasado lejano, acude también a nosotros para que podamos ofrecerte servicios que te ayuden a sanar.

Pedimos a todas las parroquias católicas, a todos los programas de Catholic Charities (Caridades Católicas), a todos los centros de salud católicos, a todas las escuelas católicas, a todos los colegios y universidades católicos y a todas las comunidades religiosas de nuestro estado que se comprometan de forma proactiva con nosotros en este esfuerzo pastoral. Juntos, a través de la Conferencia Católica del Estado de

Nueva York, hemos confeccionado una lista con muchos de los recursos disponibles en www.nyscatholic.org/HelpForMoms. Asimismo, podrán encontrar un mapa de todas las parroquias, las escuelas católicas y las agencias de Catholic Charities del estado en el sitio www.nyscatholic.org/places.

Sin embargo, nuestros gobiernos estatales y locales también deben hacer su parte. Los funcionarios elegidos por voto popular constantemente se desviven por anunciar nuevas iniciativas para ampliar una y otra vez el aborto con el fin de obtener más y más votos. Nueva York es, desde hace mucho tiempo, uno de los pocos estados que exige a los contribuyentes financiar el aborto a través de Medicaid. Planned Parenthood y otros proveedores de servicios de aborto tienen acceso a un sinfín de fuentes de financiación estatales. Tal vez la pieza más atroz de la legislación de expansión del aborto haya sido la Ley de Salud Reproductiva de 2019. Defendida por nuestro anterior gobernador, esta ley legaliza el aborto a demanda hasta los nueve meses de embarazo, declara el aborto como un derecho fundamental, permite que profesionales no médicos realicen abortos e incluso elimina las sanciones penales para los abortos bajo fuerza o coacción. Este año, nuestro actual gobernador incluyó una disposición en el presupuesto estatal que exige a todos los planes de seguro médico cubrir el aborto, sin contemplar prácticamente ninguna exención para los empleadores religiosos. Recientemente, gran cantidad de fondos de los contribuyentes fueron redirigidos para aumentar los abortos en el estado de Nueva York.





Mientras tanto, los programas de apoyo a las mujeres que deciden tener a sus bebés carecen de financiación, no se promueven de forma adecuada, o directamente no tienen cabida. Sin embargo, muchos líderes políticos suelen atender más a los prestadores de servicios de aborto y defensores del aborto que a mujeres que bien podrían tomar una decisión diferente si conocieran y tuvieran otras opciones.

Entendemos perfectamente que ninguna decisión de la Corte Suprema reducirá la disponibilidad del aborto en Nueva York. Con esta realidad como telón de fondo, el gobierno estatal no tiene nada que perder y todo por ganar si trabaja para reducir la tasa de aborto. Se pueden encontrar puntos en común, incluso en un estado como Nueva York. La reciente disposición del presupuesto estatal que amplía drásticamente la elegibilidad para cobertura de Medicaid después del parto es una prueba de ello. Pero, ¿por qué no trabajar juntos para hacer más?
