### A Reflection from the Director of Faith Formation...

When he saw him, he had compassion..." ~Luke 10:33



"Porto. Portas. Portat. Portámus. Portátis. Portant."

These Latin conjugations are still stuck in my brain thanks to the lively and enthusiastic teaching style of Msgr. James McDonald, one of our former pastors here at St. John's (may he rest in peace). When I attended OLQA, Msgr. McDonald taught a Latin class for all the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>

graders, and this is a word he always came back to - "PORTARE" - TO CARRY. As I reflected on the well-known parable of the Good Samaritan, I was struck by this memory of Msgr. McDonald and how it relates to today's Gospel.

Since the beginning of his pontificate, Pope Leo XIV has focused his Wednesday audiences on the Parables of Christ, as he states, "The lack of hope, at times, is due to the fact that we fixate on a certain rigid and closed way of seeing things, and the parables help us to look at them from another point of view."

In his May 28 audience, Pope Leo offered a reflection on the Parable of the Good Samaritan, reminding us of one of the uncomfortable truths of this story - "the practice of worship does not automatically lead to being compassionate."

The word compassion comes from another Latin word - "compassio", which means "to suffer with." The parable of the Good Samaritan reminds us that we are called to help carry each other's burdens as best we can, to "suffer with," even when it's inconvenient or uncomfortable. Obviously, this is easier said than done, but Pope Leo reminds us:

"...[A] Samaritan approaches, because if you want to help someone, you cannot think of keeping your distance, you have to get involved, get dirty, perhaps be contaminated; he binds the wounds after cleaning them with oil and wine; he loads him onto his horse, taking on the burden, because one who truly helps if one is willing to feel the weight of the other's pain..."

What can prevent us from being a "Good Samaritan?" Pope Leo notes, "We can imagine that, after staying a long time in Jerusalem, that priest and that Levite are in a hurry to return home. It is indeed haste, so present in our lives, that very often prevents us from feeling compassion."

So what can we do to slow down, to be like that Good Samaritan who carried the injured man to safety and cared for him? Pope Leo offers, "When we understand that the wounded man in the street represents each one of us. And then the memory of all the times that Jesus stopped to take care of us will make us more capable of compassion."

"I carry. You carry. He/She carries. We carry. You all carry. They carry." These translations of the Latin word "PORTARE" hold a deeper meaning for me now when I think of them in light of this parable. The Good Samaritan carries and cares for a stranger he didn't even know. Perhaps it was because the Samaritan experienced rejection himself, since Samaritans were considered "a despised people," as Pope Leo points out. This Good Samaritan recognized the injured man as his neighbor - which, Pope Leo reminds us, "literally means he who is near." May this be a reminder for us to look past the labels and prejudices present today and help carry our neighbor in their time of need.



### Moms on the Journey



#### PILGRIMS OF HOPE

To be a godparent (or a sponsor for someone who is receiving Confirmation) a Catholic must meet the following requirements. Thes are not "guidelines" here at St. John's. These are the requirements of the universal Catholic Church and are the same all over the world. Different parishes may choose to document these requirements differently. The role of sponsor is an important one!The godparent (sponsor) must be a fully initiated Catholic who supports the person receiving the sacrament through their own example of Catholic living and a desire to help the person learn more about the Catholic faith through prayer, discussion and instruction. The Catholic Church has the following requirements for godparents/sponsors:

- The sponsor must be a fully initiated member of the Catholic Church which means he or she has received the sacraments of Baptism, Eucharist (Communion) and Confirmation.
- The godparent/sponsor must be at least 16 years of age (a person younger than 16 must be fully initiated in the Catholic Church)
- The godparent/sponsor must have an active life of faith in the Catholic Church and provide good example of Catholic Living.
- If the godparent/sponsor is married, he/she must be married in the Catholic Church
- The godparent/sponsor cannot be either parent of the person being Baptized or Confirmed.

Now that you know a little more about Baptism... spread the word! We have a wonderful parish at St. John's and we are growing every day!


#### Incoming 1st Graders / New Students & Returning Students (Levels 1-8):

It is a passage, not a place to stay.




### A Message from Msgr. Walden...

We are created in the image and likeness of God, but we are not God. That is not meant to make us feel fearful or powerless but to lead us to the fullness of life personally, communally, and with God. The Ten Commandments are very basic and simple and at the same time profound, enlightening, and encouraging. Combined with the Beatitudes and Sermon on the Mount in chapters five through seven in St. Matthew's Gospel, Jesus put all moral laws, rules, and teachings in perspective. The Sermon on the Mount is one of the most powerful sermons ever given and puts our daily lives, motives, actions, and life with one another in perspective. For example in Matthew 5:21-22 Jesus says, "You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, 'You shall not kill; and whoever kills will be liable to judgment.' But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment, and whoever says to his brother, 'Raga,' will be answerable to the Sanhedrin, and whoever says, 'You fool,' will be liable to fiery Gehenna." Jesus opens our minds and hearts to see how our words and attitudes can drain life out of others and put us in opposition to one another. The only fool we speak of is ourselves. Jesus endured the foolish, hateful, angry words and actions directed against Him and remained the light of truth, goodness, mercy, reconciliation, and love.

After speaking about how He is the Bread of Life in chapter six of St. John's Gospel, we have these words in verses 67-68: "Jesus then said to the Twelve, 'Do you also want to leave?' Simon Peter answered him, 'Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." In another encounter with Jesus in Matthew 18:21-22, we have these words, "Then Peter approaching asked him, 'Lord, if my brother sins against me, how often must I forgive him? As many as seven times?' Jesus answered, 'I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times.'" From perspective, as we do more and say more in the image in which we are created, we become more and more fully alive, hopeful,

and joyful.

The Gospel for today's Mass continues to expand the perspective through

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

"Today you will be with me in Paradise,"

"Woman, behold your son, Son, behold your mother."

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?,"

"I thirst."

"It is finished."

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."





Jesus told the Parable of the Good Samaritan to show the people what it means to love your neighbour after someone asked Him "Who is my neighbour?"


# Loving God and Our Neighbour
