



A Reflection on the Gospel...

"But who do you say that I am?"

Jesus was judged, by many, according to the flesh. But in that moment, Peter, guided by the Holy Spirit, replied, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Peter struggled with his humanity, just like we do, but when Jesus asked the question, Peter answered with no hesitation. Later, however, when Jesus told His disciples that He must go to Jerusalem to suffer and die, Peter said, "God forbid, Lord! No such thing shall ever happen to you." Jesus turned and said to Peter, "You are an obstacle to me. You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Peter's conflicting attitude reminds us of how often we find ourselves stuck between our spirituality and our humanity. To recognize who God is and to accept His mission are two very different things. Peter represents the best and the worst of our nature. His charac-

ter reminds us of our own constant battle between the spirit and the flesh. We heard in a previous gospel how Peter started to walk on the water when he trusted in the Spirit. But when he let doubt get in his way, his flesh betrayed him, and he began to sink. On another occasion, Peter asked Jesus how many times a person should be expected to forgive, thinking the answer might have been seven (a number which signifies perfection in the Jewish faith). Here, Peter's intention was oriented towards the spirit of forgiveness, but he was also looking for a finite number, something in the flesh. The truth is that forgiveness requires love, which itself is infinite.



Unlike Judas, who gave into despair after his betrayal of Jesus, Peter prevailed when he was tempted to lose hope after denying his friendship with Jesus. With a broken heart, he wept bitterly, and then sought a reconciliation with the Lord after His Resurrection. He didn't give up. Like all of us, Peter struggled with his own human challenges, but he had the humility to seek forgiveness, and the moral courage to risk everything for the sake of the Truth. In the exchange between Jesus and Peter in today's gospel, Jesus clearly referenced Isaiah Chapter 22, and the story of how Shebna was ousted as the al-habayith (master of the house), and was replaced by Eliakim, who was 'given the keys' to the kingdom of Judah. Eliakim was also given the authority of a father: What he opens, no one shall shut; what he shuts, no one shall open.

God doesn't make mistakes. Jesus chose Peter for a reason. He wanted the first leader of the Church to understand that it's the limitations of our humanity that allow us to be open to the limitless power of God's divinity. Jesus also gave Peter an opportunity for restitution. He later asked Peter three times, "Do you love me?" And three times Peter answered, "Yes, Lord, I love you." These three (post-Resurrection) professions of love served to beautifully undo his three denials of Jesus (before the Crucifixion). Peter stumbled, but he always got up again, and when Jesus handed His mission over to the Apostles, Peter was all in.

So who do we say He is? And are we courageous enough, like Peter, to publicly say it out loud? And who do people say we are? Do we give people a reason to believe we are who we claim to be?

Jesus gave the world every reason to believe He is who He claimed to be. He laid down His life for us. And before His Ascension, He said, "I will not leave you orphans." And He hasn't. The Holy Spirit has been guiding the Church ever since, and will continue, until Jesus comes again in His glory. And what is true friendship? Do we exhibit our friendship with the Lord? Are we truly affected when we hear God's name taken in vain? Do we turn the TV channel when its material starts to become inappropriate? Do we walk away from situations that aren't in line with God's teaching? Do we defend our faith when it is being disrespected? Do we have the moral courage to speak up when faced with the immoralities of this world? Maybe we should be asking ourselves, "What have we done for Him lately?" Jesus told Peter that flesh and blood had not revealed the Truth to him. That's because flesh and blood provide no armor for the soul. The only thing that protects and builds up the soul is a true relationship with God. Peter was genuine in his desire to have a relationship with Jesus, and that relationship has lasted for almost two thousand years...and counting.

Behind all of Peter's human imperfections was a prevailing faith, just waiting to be unlocked. Jesus understands the struggle, and yet He has enough confidence in humanity to trust us with the keys. That confidence should give us the courage to keep heading towards the right door. Through Peter, we learn that when we rely on our flesh alone, we crumble. But when we yield to the Spirit, we are rock solid. And even though a rock is not protected from weathering, it still provides the solid material for a secure foundation, which Peter and his successors have done for the Church for centuries.

Who is Jesus? He is the Way to Heaven. He is the Truth that guides us on our journey. And He is the Life that's given to those who follow Him. Remember how God referred to Himself as I AM in the Old Testament? In to-day's gospel, Jesus asked Peter "Who do you say that I AM?" Isn't it interesting that the answer is found in the question itself? Peter answered correctly, and got sent to the head of the class, so to speak. In a sense, we are also asked that question every day by the very nature of being in this world. We answer it over and over again by the way we live our lives. How often do we answer that question correctly? Every time we are courageous enough to speak the Truth, we are giving the right answer.





GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


I am glad I was duped. Yep, the illusionist in the show we attended had me fooled into seeing something one way and it turns out it was completely false. The show was entertaining, and worth the time and expense we invested to enjoy it. And ... it may be the only circumstance where the word "duped" can be used in the same sentence as "glad." That certainly wasn't Jeremiah's experience! His prayer reflects frustration and hurt, and even a little bit of disgust at how he has been treated because of the Lord: "I say to myself, I will not mention him. I will speak in his name no more." But then, even in his discontent and disillusion, he holds on to the truth. For right after this rebellious admission, he confesses that the need to prophesy "becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones; I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it." He knows he was never really duped - there was no lie from the Lord. And the fact is, he believes and trusts in the Lord enough to pray to him in the first place; even in his prayer of lament he is praising the Lord as God and redeemer. Jeremiah's example is a good one for us: Never lose sight of the Lord as our God. Pray to him; give over our frustrations to him; and allow him to be the fire burning in our heart that we cannot quench.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Reading today's Gospel leaves me feeling awkward and even embarrassed for St. Peter. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, calling the first pope Satan and telling Peter to get behind him - super embarrassing, especially when Peter had good intentions in trying to protect Jesus. What's the old saying, "The road to hell is paved with good intentions"? There's another axiom, a little less dire but just as pointed: "People judge you by your actions, not your intentions. You may have a heart of gold, but so does a hard-boiled egg." Intentions matter - but how we enact and employ those intentions are important, too. Christ tells us in today's Gospel, "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." Faith in God, believing in his promises, and wanting to obey his commandments are wonderful and essential - and they are the foundation of a life lived for Christ. But they are not the entirety of it, and while denying ourselves and taking up our cross is never easy, it is necessary. "What profit would there by for one to gain the whole world and forfeit his life?" Christ asks. Let's pray for the grace of pure intentions and the strength to live them in service to the Lord.

PRAY Heavenly Father, uncover my eyes and reveal any obstacles keeping me from thinking as you do. Give me the courage to overcome these obstacles, and grant me the strength to take up my cross and follow you, even in the face of difficulty. I ask this through your Son, Christ our Lord.

God is not looking for perfection when it comes to his leaders, he is looking for true and loving hearts. In the first reading, God is not impressed with the master of the palace as a father for the people of Jerusalem. Eliakim the servant has the heart God desires. God will give Eliakim whatever he needs to guide his people – the right clothes, authority, and a place of honor. And we learn in the Gospel that Peter has the heart of love Jesus knows is necessary to guide his followers after he is gone. There are more learned and powerful men, but they lack Peter's faith. Jesus knows Peter is not perfect and he has much to learn, but Peter has the right foundation for the Church. We don't need to be the smartest people or have money and influence to be God's leaders. We need hearts of love and faith, and God will give us the tools we need to do the work.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

There is much to be done in our parishes and God needs our hearts and faith to get to work. How can we use our gifts and talents to help make the parish a welcoming place? For some it might be liturgical ministry, but every church needs people to work behind the scenes. Dusting and cleaning the church is not a glamorous job, but caring for the house of God is a blessing in itself. Helping the parish office with special mailings or weekly tasks is welcome to the staff who have so many responsibilities. Why not use the eyes of the Father to look in our hearts and see how we can make our parish a foundation of faith for all our family? We can also use God's sight to look for people at Mass who need an invitation to be more active in the parish, sharing the reminder none of us have to be perfect people to participate. We just need hearts of love.

ACT Look over the bulletin this week and reflect on where your talents could make a difference in your parish. Ask the Holy Spirit to give you the wisdom and guidance you need to find where God wants you to be and what he wants you to do. Extend an invitation to one person to join you in participating in a church ministry.






