A Reflection from Deacon Michael Hoonhout...

24th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Sept 14, 2025

Looking at a crucifix, a non-Catholic Christian once asked me, "Why do you Catholics keep Jesus hanging on the cross? He's not on it anymore. He rose from the dead!" I was rather shocked by his question, having never looked at a crucifix with that perspective before. His view was reflective of that tendency in Protestantism to reject statues. Maybe you've noticed that they hang only bare wooden crosses in their churches, while we Catholics prefer cross and *corpus*—a crucifix.

Today's Gospel for the beautiful feast of the Exaltation of the Cross provides the reason why the Catholic Church still venerates crucifixes and images of Jesus Christ being crucified, even though we firmly believe that he rose bodily from the grave and reigns in glory. At every Sunday Mass, the first reading from the Old Testament is chosen because it points to and is fulfilled in the Gospel account. In her Tradition, the Church has drawn out these parallels between both Testaments, but the one in this reading from the Gospel of John is made by Jesus himself. "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." (John 3:15). Nicholas the Pharisee, to whom Jesus is speaking, would have known the passage from the Book of Numbers to which Jesus is referring, as it was a very unusual and unforgettable event in Israel's desert journey.

As is typical of these biblical pairings of prefigurement and fulfillment, the parallel has multiple dimensions. Jesus links Moses' mounting a serpent on a pole to his impending crucifixion because like the serpent, Jesus will be "lifted up" on the cross. The effect of each action is also similar, for the people who had been bitten by the seraph serpents and then looked at the elevated bronze serpent were healed from the snake poison and saved from death, while those of us who look with faith upon the crucified Jesus lifted up on the cross are healed from sin and saved from death. This parallel is even stronger when you can consider that human sin and death began because of the serpent in the garden of Eden. The human race was 'snake bit' by Satan and ever since the venom of sin has infected our nature, dooming it to end in death.

Another parallel is that Moses mounts the serpent on the pole in obedience to God's command in order to remove the punishment of Israel's sinful disobedience. Likewise, Jesus

willingly allows himself to be lifted up on the cross in

obedience to his Father's will to redeem us from the punishment of our sinful disobedience: death and damnation. At the time, Jesus' disciples could not grasp why God would have his Messiah be crucified, and there are those today who shake their heads at the idea that God would ordain that salvation come through the unjust crucifixion of an innocent man. Having a man lifted up on a cross is a strange way to save the world. Yet Moses too may have wondered at God's proposed solution to the poisonous snakes, for in the second commandment, God had explicitly forbidden Israel from making an idolatrous representation of any creature: "You shall not make for yourself an idol or a likeness of anything in the heavens above or on the earth below or in the waters beneath the earth." (Ex 20:4). God was furious when Moses' brother Aaron made a golden calf for the Israelites to worship (Ex 32), and yet here He tells Moses to make a bronze serpent for them to look at and be healed. To be clear, God did not command Moses to make an idol, but what He does tell him to do could easily have been misunderstood in that sense, especially since the bronze representation of the snake was God's instrument for healing the people.

God chose this strange way of healing His chosen people through a serpent mounted on a pole precisely because it would foreshadow healing of the world from sin and death through the cross of Christ. For that healing to take place, we need to look upon Jesus Christ crucified and believe that through his death and Resurrection we have eternal life. So the Church is wise to keep Jesus hanging on the cross in her many symbol representations. There is healing in gazing upon Christ crucified, meditating upon the great love that drove Jesus to suffer and die on the cross.

We rejoice in Christ's Resurrection because of its promise that one day we will be free from all suffering and death. Yet, while on our journey to the promised land, we need to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus mounted on a tree. Looking at a crucifix can console us in our sufferings and strengthen us to carry our crosses. There is no greater image of the depth of God's love and mercy for us than Jesus lifted up on the cross.




Votive Candles/Altar Candles


Women's Group...







A Message from Msgr. Walden...

What is truly important and gives life to myself and others is sharing who I am and what I have and can do through, with, for, and in others. How much is enough? How much is too little? Today we celebrate the feast of the Exaltation of the Cross. In spite of the fact that Jesus did not come to condemn, reject, punish, or judge us, He was condemned, rejected, punished and judged so unjustly. At times we start to think that we have reached our limit in love and concern and either walk away or seethe in anger. We feel we don't deserve rejection or what we consider to be demands that are below us or too far above us. What Iesus humbled and lowered Himself to do for us is summed up in these words from the second reading at Mass today (Philippians 2:6-11): "Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, humbled himself, becoming obedient to death, even death cross." Through, with, and in Him we see and experience God's merciful love as a pure gift.

In Jesus we see the height and depth of God's love for us. We calculate the price of material things and think about what we get out of all we do for the people in our lives. We do learn how to deal with one another in a simple way,

but how much depth is there in our gratitude and desire to extend ourselves. The



depth of God's love is seen so clearly in Jesus embracing the cross out of pure love and mercy. He does not demand or threaten us if we do not respond. But choosing to reject or ignore Him and His life-giving love leaves us inwardly restless and we fruitlessly seek peace and life from power, pleasure, money, things or mindless screen time.

"To err is human; to forgive is divine!" Can I give without counting the cost? Where do my mind, heart, hopes, and love shut down and turn to restless anger and frustration? The Exaltation of the Cross shows us that at the place where all seemed lost and the power of evil prevailed was but a brief moment of victory, not the end. Every time we make the sign of the cross, we remind ourselves of God's presence, life, and love in our lives. The key is to embrace the sign of the cross and make that a simple yet powerful reminder of the power of the love that not only overcomes evil but, even more enriches, sustains, and fills us with gratitude, courage, and divine wisdom.

When I finished writing this column, I went on the internet and found two simple songs that Exalt the Cross and the power of Jesus' love on it. I invite you to listen to them: "Lay Your Burden Down" by Chuck Girard and "Lay Your Burdens Down" by Amanda Joy Powell.




