A Message from our Pastor, Fr. Patrick... Gospel Reflection

"The Parable of the Unforgiving Servant" (Mt 18:21-35)

It is clear in today's gospel that God's ways are not always our ways. They are radically different, especially when it comes to extending mercy towards others. Our first reaction after hearing today's gospel parable on forgiveness, might be how could the first servant not forgive his own fellow servant, after his master had just forgiven him of his entire debt. This debt was estimated to be 10,000 talents. Back in ancient times, this number of talents was worth about a half of a lifetime of wages, a huge amount. So, it was no small debt.

We see in today's parable how merciful the master was towards his own servant who begged him to delay the time he needed to repay his entire debt. Not only did he listen to him, but he also responded radically. He decided to cancel his entire debt, which was unheard of back then, even as it would be today. Yet after this servant was completely forgiven of his debt, we quickly see how ruthless he was towards his own fellow servant who owed him so much less. The amount owed was equivalent to hundred-day wages in ancient times. Instead of forgiving his fellow servant in the same way in which he was quickly forgiven, he began beating him and choking him and had him thrown into prison until his entire debt was paid.

How can we not be disturbed or disappointed with the unforgiving servant, who was shown great respect and mercy when he begged for an extension to pay his debt. Maybe we think the master was crazy for forgiving his entire debt instead of making him pay his debt at least in the long-term. We wonder why the master did not see through him. But the point of today's parable is to remind us how radically different God's ways are compared to ours. How patient He is with us in giving us another opportunity to reform our lives.

It is mind-boggling to comprehend how shameful and evil his actions were after being freed of his entire debt. How could he not be as understanding and forgiving knowing how much bigger his debt was and what he would have lost if his master was not compassionate towards him. In addition to losing all of his property; his family, including his wife and children, would have been sold into slavery. This is what was at stake, his entire family and his livelihood. And yet, he responded totally differently than his master. How could he not forgive his own servant in exactly the same way in which he was forgiven is beyond our understanding? How could he not be touched by his master's goodness towards him with all that was at stake?



But the purpose of a parable is to draw our attention; to collect our thoughts. It is to wake us up and get us thinking as God thinks and how we can cooperate with His graces. The purpose of a parable is to bring us closer to God and to teach us the ways of God. It is to inspire us to live our lives differently.

No question there is a direct parallel between today's gospel and the Lord's Prayer. We hear over and over again, each time we recite this ancient prayer, how important it is for us to forgive, if we want to be forgiven by God. "Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those." In actuality, what we are saying here is, only forgive us, God, as we forgive others. Therefore, if we fail to forgive others in the same way in which we want to be forgiven, then what we are saying each time we recite this ancient church prayer, then heavenly Father do not forgive us of our trespasses.

We heard Peter say from the beginning of today's gospel, "Lord, how often must I forgive? Seven times?" Jesus answered, "not seven times, but seventy-seven times." Seven times may seem to be a lot. But it is still limited. Seventy-seven times was Jesus' way of saying an unlimited number of times. Jesus wants us to forgive always. He wants us to forgive unconditionally, like our heavenly Father. The purpose of today's parable on forgiveness and the importance behind forgiveness is to instill in us how essential it is for us to forgive. It is important because forgiveness leads to reconciliation. It allows us to be reconciled with God and with one another. Forgiveness brings us closer to God and closer to one another. Forgiveness leads us to peace of mind and to a greater understanding of our faith because forgive because forgiveness is at the heart of the gospel. It is what ultimately unites us to God and one another. It leads us to a life of blessings!

It is always sad to hear how families and friendships are torn apart for much less offences than found in today's gospel. Why are so many of us failing to forgive at times when we know the freedom it brings into our lives when we forgive others from the heart? The truth is, Jesus would not ask us to do anything He would not do or did not do. "Father forgive them for they do not know what they are doing. If they knew that I was the Son of God, they never would have crucified me in the first place." Not only did Jesus forgive others who crucified Him, but He made excuses for them too. That is how great and reassuring His love is for humanity! And all the Lord wants of us, as the master wanted of his servant in today's gospel, is to extend this kind of mercy in the same way. To be generous in our love and understanding for others, as God is towards us. To see where others may be coming from and to be touched by His goodness and His complete love and concern for us all.

Even though it is hard to fathom how ruthless this first servant was towards his own servant, how many times have we failed to extend the same level of mercy we have received from God towards others who may have offended us in one way or another. We know from our prayers and from the teachings of the Church how God continues to free us from our sins; how He wipes away our tears and brings us to new life. It is clear from the Scriptures, that there is no sin greater than His love for us, and no sin He did not die for.

It is clear that the criteria for happiness is through forgiveness, in sharing in the same level of compassion

that the Lord has for us all. To be humble and grateful before God and to respond to others who have hurt us with compassion and understanding knowing of our own shortcomings and failings. If we really think about it, if we fail to forgive others, we only hurt ourselves. We only remain imprisoned in our own hearts. We only remain bitter, resentful and unhappy in the long run. We become very hostile and restless. It is clear from today's parable that the path to happiness is letting go! It is through forgiveness, in forgiving others in the same way in which we want to be forgiven, that makes all the difference in living a joyful Christian life!

Holy Thursday...Washing of the Feet...A New Commandment... The Call to Serve "Inspired by our Patron, St. Jo

Why am I writing about Holy Thursday in September? Let me share with you the story of how I recognized that Holy Thursday was not a single day that falls during Holy Week each year, but rather, a day that reminds us of our daily call to serve.

A while back, I was asked to participate in the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday by having my feet washed. I was extremely uncomfortable with the idea, but not wanting to say no, I "just did it." Two years ago, I was asked once again, and this time, I did not want to "just do it." I wanted to know more...to understand it more completely, and so I took a deeper dive into the significance of Holy Thursday, and Jesus washing the feet of his disciples.

I turned to the gospel of John (13: 14-17).

Jesus instructs them, "If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you. Most assuredly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master; nor is he who is sent greater than he who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."

It was not necessary for Jesus to clean the disciple's feet because in accordance with the customs of the time, they would have already been washed by a servant when they entered the Upper Room. Jesus' choice to wash the feet exemplifies humble service toward others. Assuming the role of servant, Jesus, makes it clear that he came not to **be served**, but **to serve**. Equally as clear, is our responsibility to follow his example.

I also learned that Holy Thursday is sometimes called "Maundy Thursday". The word "Maundy" is from the Latin word man datum, or "mandate". At the end of the Last Supper, Jesus gave a new commandment; a simple, yet challenging mandate.

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another." (John 14: 34-35)

Like so many of you, I had heard this "new" commandment many times. I try to live it every day; some days, living it better than others. But two years ago, as I dove deeper, this commandment took on a new meaning for me; the connection between service to others and serving with love became clear. I reflected on our parish mission statement. "Inspired by our Patron, St. John the Evangelist, we seek to bring the light of Christ to a world in need, so that as Christ has done, we may also do. From the celebration of the Eucharist, we are sent forth to serve God and neighbor through ministries of formation, education, and outreach."

My "aha moment" two years ago, connected Holy Thursday to Eucharist to loving one another to humble service to the "mission" of our parish. Thank you, Holy Spirit!

St. John's offers many opportunities to serve God and neighbor...to live out our parish mission. In my role as Coordinator of Parish Social Ministry, I have been blessed with many opportunities to deepen my faith through service to others. One such opportunity to serve is through our Street Ministry. St. John's Street Ministry was formed in 2018, with a mission to find and serve those marginalized in our local community. Many are homeless, and unable to receive other supportive services. Our volunteers serve with great love, compassion, and respect; using their many God-given talents to serve those in need and to see the face of Jesus in every person they encounter. In practical, clearcut ways the Street Ministry follows Jesus' example of humble service and his mandate to love one another. We live the gospel by feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty and clothing the naked. But every Thursday evening, the most valuable way we love our neighbors is through the gift of our time and attention, as we connect with those we serve through heartfelt conversation and compassionate, patient listening. It truly is a beautiful ministry.

Our Street Ministry needs new disciples, willing to wash the feet of their neighbors and to share their love for others. I invite each of you to consider the many gifts that God has given you. Think about how you can use and share your talents with others. Perhaps becoming part of the Street Ministry is a possibility. There are so many diverse ways to participate. We will be hosting an information session on **Tuesday, September 26 at**

7pm in the school auditorium. You will have the opportunity to learn about what we do, meet our ministry leaders, ask questions, and see how you can share your talents and love.

It is my hope, that in the words of St. Mother Teresa, we will all be inspired to, "do small things with great love."


WE NEED YOUR HELP!
