# A Reflection from the Director of Music Ministry...

A Reflection on the Gospel: Luke 14:1, 7-14

"For every one who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

Having humility doesn't mean we think less of ourselves. It means we think of ourselves less, which gives us an opportunity to think about God and others more often. As Jesus dines at the home of one of the leading Pharisees, He notices the guests jockeying for the best seats and then offers a parable centered around a wedding banquet to teach about humility and radical hospitality. He advises those at such an event to take the lowest place with the possibility of being invited to a more favorable one, rather than taking the highest place and risking humiliation by being asked to move. Here, Jesus emphasizes that true greatness in God's eyes is found in humility, not in self-promotion or seeking social status. Jesus also challenges the typical social dynamics of the time, where invitations were often extended based on social standing and the expectation of reciprocal favors, in which case the repayment would merely complete a type of meaningless circle. He

encourages the host to invite those who cannot repay him, focusing on compassion and selfless service, which will be rewarded in Heaven. The advice that Jesus gives here takes on a theological nature, for our 'table manners' in this life are directly connected to our hope of one day being invited to sit at God's heavenly banquet table. Jesus wants us to place our ordinary lives within a divine horizon that invokes the presence of the One who

is both Guest and Host.

This parable highlights the contrast between the values of this world and the values of the Kingdom of God, reflecting a consistent theme in Luke's Gospel of a reversal of fortunes, in which the last will be first, and the first will be last. This reversal is not limited to a hope for something in the future. It can also become a reality in the present for those who embrace the values that Christ taught us. We all like to fit in, but when we get too caught up in placement, we can lose our perspective regarding what's important. The only place our souls truly long to be is in Heaven, and we can't get there by climbing over others. The journey through this life is a complicated one, but none of us will be fit for travel unless we 'suit ourselves up' in humility. Sometimes we get stuck looking through the lens of pride. However, the more we humble ourselves, the more we give glory to God, who (through His Son) has shown the greatest act of humility. Jesus came down to Earth specifically to show us how it's done. He offered us the blueprint through His example. Giving way to humility costs us a piece of ourselves, but through it we gain grace, and grace is like a spiritual vitamin that builds up our immunity against the sickness of sin. It is one vitamin we can't afford to be deficient in.

Earthly labels mean nothing to God. In the end, He will gather us up, and those found worthy to be exalted will have been the ones who humbled themselves and loved for the sake of love. Every downward step we take toward humility is an upward step we take toward Heaven. We are like grains of sand on a beach. The rush of the tide moves each one around differently, moment by moment. No one's journey is the same as anyone else's. Just as all the grains of sand are created to operate in conjunction with each other as part of a finite system, all human beings are created by a loving God to co-exist as part of His eternal plan. Though we each have a unique role, we are all equal in God's eyes because we are made in His image. It's a mere illusion to think that any one person is better or worse than another. What make us the same is that we are all equally nothing without God. Instead of spending precious time

comparing ourselves to each other on Earth, perhaps our

time would be better spent helping each other get to Heaven.

A large portion of our human condition consists of our struggle between pride and humility. The first sin came about through pride, and humility is the only virtue that the devil cannot imitate. The Book of Proverbs teaches us that pride goes before destruction,

and humility comes before honor. Pride draws us toward sin, while humility leads us away from it. Pride serves only one, but when we humble ourselves for God's sake, the possibilities become endless, and God is never outdone in generosity. Humility mixed with faith is a heavenly combination. Our humility on Earth will gain us honor in Heaven. In earthly terms, it's often far better to be in the back (aware of what's going on in front of you) than in the front (wondering what's going on behind your back).

It is an effective practice to look for opportunities that allow the seeds of humility to grow within us. Every act of humility sheds a layer of pride, making us 'littler' each time. And the 'littler' we become, the better God can see us. Our Blessed Mother teaches us that it is through our lowliness that we reach our ultimate height.

No matter what we have, there will always be someone who has more, and someone who has less, and those who may seem to have an advantage aren't necessarily better off. No matter who we are or where we come from, this life is a preparation for where we are going. We have all been invited to God's Wedding Feast, but we need to live up to that honor, and be ready at any moment (in heart, soul, and mind) for the Bridegroom's call.


## Women's Group... Our Women's Group will begin again on Monday, September 22,

# A Message from Msgr. Walden...

When we buy a ticket in advance to a sporting event we can pick the seat we will watch the game Whenever we accept an invitation to a reception, we wonder not so much where we will sit but who will be at our table. In the Gospel for today's Mass (Luke 14:1, 7-14) Jesus tells a parable about guests looking for seats of honor at a wedding banquet. Every Sunday, Jesus is our host as well as His presence sacramentally in the Eucharist we receive. While we might have a usual or routine place we sit in church when we come to Mass; without assigned seats, we are all free to sit where we want and who we want to sit with. But where is the best seat in our church or any church building we enter? In reality, it is not the seat where we physically sit, but the inner recesses of our heart where we welcome Jesus and His love with faith, hope, love, joy, and gratitude.

We use the expression "deep seated" to describe our beliefs, our love, and our joys. There is also a negative side to things that are "deep seated": deep seated anger, deep frustration, deep seated feelings of revenge, deep seated selfishness, deep seated addictions to substances, drugs, or pornography. None of these negative feelings bring reconciliation. But deep seated love opens our hearts to sacrifice, generosity, forgiveness, love, and hope. The fire of God's love and mercy was pouring forth from Jesus' human heart as we contemplate His last words on the cross: "This day you will be with me in paradise" (Luke 23:43), "Father, forgive them they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34), "Son there is your mother; Mother, there is your Son" (John 19:26-27). As we look at the cross and see the horror of its injustice, brutality, and the taunting of the crowd against Him, Jesus persevered in perfect, deep seated faith, hope, and love. Neither retaliation, anger, or revenge came from His heart or His words. There is no greater example of deep seated, pure, hopeful love.

The more we are able to focus on our words of prayer and participation at Mass and receiving absolution in the Sacrament of Penance, the more powerful our love and desire for reconciliation with God and one another, and the more we are filled with



gratitude and thanksgiving. That brings us to the point where we not only thank God from our hearts for the gift of faith, we become signs and sources of His love. How good it is when our love, mercy, and generosity come from a grateful, faithful heart.

The best seat in any church we come into is a heart overflowing with the joy of being loved by God and loving Him in return. And that love cannot help but overflow in the way we love the people we encounter intimately, joyfully and gratefully everyday of our lives. How wonderful it is to have a seat of honor in our hearts for Jesus and all He entrusts to our loving presence.

O God, you are my God, for you I long; for you my soul is thirsting.


My body pines for you like a dry, weary land without water.
